From the January 1, 1940 issue of the bulletin the Brevities column noted the following: Dave Thomas' station WUMS at Proctorville, Ohio was the first station of its kind in the world......Jake Field of San Diego, California reported WHIS,WLAP, WKST, WIBM, all 2000 milers and KOME a 1400 miler as the latest additions to his log. Phil Nichols of East Hartford, Conn. volunteered that there are plenty of DX tips and data in the bulletin these days. Continuing Phil stated that for the information of several backsliders like Hank Tyndall, Lloyd Hahn, Bill Applegate and Jeff French he expected to keep at it until Spring. His verifications were at 990 with 13 reports out and sufficient enough to place him past the 1000 mark..... Squire Roy X. Utter of Succasunna, N. J. was referred to as being relegated to the side lines and the only thing Roy caught this season was a cold and he wasn't able to hang on to that too long!......Steve Johnson, Havre de Grace, Md. was indoubt about a Spanish speaking station behind WENR around 1830. Steve believed it was CMHT in Cuba.

From Earl Roberts the following stations in Cuba were under construction: 570kc. Santa Clara; 670 Jovellanos; 710 Camaguey; 730 Las Tunas; 740 Guantanamo; 870 Ciego de Avila; 990 Pinar de! Rio; 1030 Santiago de Cuba; 1040 Matanzas and 1150 Holguin. All of these stations to be operated by Radio Habana, Cuba, S. A.

On 700kcs. W8XO Cincinnati was using 500kw from midnight to 0200 as reported by Jake Field.....S. C. Kellenberger, Riverside, Ill. sent a clipping reporting that the Mexican Senate had finally ratified the North American Regional Broadcasting Agreement, and according to the FCC, this means that a new allocation scheme will likely go into effect in the near future.....Also, S. C. Kellenberger wrote that listeners should not give up hope of trying for USA short-wave stations just because they are beamed at some foreign country. NBC short-wave experts were quite surprised to receive fan mail from Alaska about short-wave programs beamed by directional antenna to South America until they realized that the radio waves had gone all the way around the earth and hit Alaska on the return journey.

During the month of January, 1940 the new Merit Certificate was made ready for issuance by Chairman Joseph F. Smith. Joe drew attention to the fact that it will meet the requirements of the beginner with 100 verified stations as well as the veteran who has 1,000 or more and is aspiring to reach the 2,000 goal.

The following stations were reported on High Frequencies: DJQ 15.280 Berlin by Sergio Gonzalez, Cuba; PCJ 15.220 Huizen, Netherlands, DJB 15.200 Berlin by Sergio Gonzalez; Radio Saigon, Indo-China 11.780 by Jimmy Hart; I2AA 9.65 Addis Ababa, Italian East Africa by Desmond Callan; NNBD 3.410 Brenton Reef LS, Rhode Island and NNBS Pollock Rip Lightship, Mass. in contact with NMF Winthrop Radio, Mass by Leboeuf.

Desmond Callan wrote that it was announced over the BBC in London on 1/12/40 the Lahti, Finland SW transmitter had been hit by a bomb and that it would be out of service for some time.

In Germany a ban was placed on listening to foreign broadcasts. An ordinance dated August 30, 1939 provided that anyone violating this ordinance would be condemned to forced labor or in less serious cases prison and the receiving apparatus to be confiscated. Violations would be punished by special courts through the Reich Minister of Education and Propaganda.

This just about takes care of everything that is possible to print in this issue. In closing, now that I have several lines left, I would like to hear from all DXers who have been in the NNRC for 15 years or more. I may then be on the lookout for a report or a tip of those by-gone days. Please write, as I want to place the news about you in this column. We try to pick out the names of those now active but it is a hard job. Also your comments will be appreciated about improving.

In the January 29, 1940 issue of the bulletin, Director S.C. Kellenberger forwarded a clipping from Broadcasting magazine listing the stations expected to be affiliated with the new Transcontinental Broadcasting System. The stations were as follows: WCOV, KGHI, KERN, KFOX, KFWB, KFBK, KYA, KWG, WMFJ, WKAT, WTMS, WFOY, WGAU, WAYX, WDWS, WIND, WJJD, WCBS, KFJB, KSCJ, KGNO, KWBG, KSAL, WJBW, WCBM, WJEJ, WMEX, WHDF, WJBK, WJMS, WDMJ, KATE KGDE, WDGY, KWNO, WSLI, KFRU, KCMO, KXOK, KDRO, KFOR, KOH, WABY, WMBO, WBNY, WMCA, WGNC, WFTC, WRAL, WGTM, KDLR, KRMC, KGCU, KLPM, KOVC, WJW, WCPO, WING, WTOL, KOCY, KOME, KQV, WCOS, WSPA, KABR, KABC, KRBC, KFDA, KNOW, KBST, KAND, KFJZ, KLUF, WXYZ, KFRO, KFYO, KPLT, KPAC, KGKO, KRRV, KTEM, KCMC, KGKB KVWC, WACO, KVNU, KUTA, WGH, WEMP, WRJN, WDSM, and WSAU, 102 in all. Most of the TBS programs would originate in New York at WMCA; WJJD and WIND in Chicago and KFWB in Hol= lywood, California.

Also, In January, 1940, Phil Nichols, East Hartford, Conn. reached a goal long sought after by many DXers- that of 1000 verified stations. Included in the verified log were 159 stations from over 2000 miles- 1 each from Spain, Portugal, Africa, Ireland, Belgium, Denmark, 5 from Italy and 8 each from Germany and France. Phil in his report pleaded for a DX report from Preident Irv Potts and also from '100 watt'Les Kraemer.

Stations reported on the High Frequencies included XGOX 15.200 mcs. Szechwan, China at sign-on 2000 by Desmond Callan, Mass.; Moscow, USSR on 10.080 in the afternoons by Desmond Callan and Earl Roberts; HNF 9.683 mcs. Baghdad, Iraq by Callan as operating on this frequency 0600-1500; KZRH 9.635mcs. Manila, P. I. at 0715 by Desmond Callan; RAN 9.600mcs. Moscow at 1930 by Callan; and I2RO1 6.085mcs. Rome, Italy "Radio Roma" signing on at 1800.

Dick Daneker, Lansdale, Pa. reported that DXing was good on the mornings of January 6 and 7, 1940. Dick heard for the first time, two stations from across the Pacific, namely 1YA and 2YA. Also heard were the English stations on 668, 767 and 1149kcs.; Lyons 648; Paris PTT 695; Toulouse 776; Milano 814; Rennes 1040; Bordeaux 1077; Radio Normandie 1095; TIX 650; TILS 880; TIEP 830; HOK Colon, Panama 640; YV1RF 1120; YV3RA 1270; FQN 609; HJBN 1190 and TG-1 1310.

From the High Frequencies of February 12, 1940 the following were reported: XGOY 11.900 Szechwan, China at 1700 by Jimmy Hart; JZJ 11.800 Tokyo at 1700 by Jimmy Hart; ZHP 9.680 Singapore, Straits Settlements heard with the best signal yet from a Far East Station by Jimmy Hart; RAN 9.600 Moscow signing on at 1630 by Charles Leboeuf; COCY 9.220 Havana, Cuba the new SW Relay for CMBH and CMBX at 2220 by Earl Roberts; FOSAA Papeete, Tahiti 7.100 verification received after one year and three days by Jake Field, California; and PMY 5.140 Bandoeng, Java at 0622 by Earl Roberts.

Reported on the BCB for February 12, 1940 issue were: XERB 1090 Rosarito Beach, B. California on the air irregularly by Jake Field; CMKX 1185 Banes, Cuba testing most of the morning January 26 by Phil Nichols; XEAU 1410 Luis Allades, Mexico re-opened on Jan. 29 and wanted reports by Jake Field; XEAG 1450 Reynosa, Mexico heard asking for reports by John L. Tate and HOK Colon, Panama heard from 0300-0400 with their recent DX by Frank Pytlak.

In the February 22, 1940 issue, Joseph F. Smith, Chairman of the DX Qualifications Committee reported the total number of certificates issued to date: Junior 165; Master 157; Past Master 141; Ace 192; Super Ace 126 and Silver Ace 34.

Roger Legge reported that although mainly interested in the short waves and having never tuned much on the BCB, he recently ran across a few foreign stations: HJAN, TIPG, TGW, ZNS and VONF and the 4 Puerto Rican stations. Roger also reported that all Colombians are changing their calls by dropping the numerals and the next to the last letter of the call...... All for now and good DXing to all.

From the pages of the February 19, 1940 issue, Hank Tyndall reported that TGQ 1450kcs. "La Voz de Quezaltenango", Quezaltenango, Guatemala verified promptly with Eduardo Perez F. as the signer and also that he had recently received a verification from LS-11 Buenos Aires, Argentina......Bill Bauer, Baltimore, Md. postcarded that he had recently added YVIRF, YV4RG, YV1RK, LRA, PRG9, HJ3CAZ, HJ3CAB, CBR, KWSC, KGIR, KFPA, KFPM, HJAN, KTAB and WBAB.

On High Frequencies the following were reported: YUF 15.240 Belgrade schedule 1900-2000 for South America and YUG 15.240 Belgrade 2000-2100 for North America. HBJ 14.535 Geneva transmitted the speech of the Crown Prince speaking from Oslo. Radio Indo-Chine 11.850 operating from 0530-0900 with news in French around 0730. Radio Boy Landry, Saigon 9.670 at 0700 by Desmond Callan; HVJ Vatican City 9.660 testing Sunday and Thursday 0830-0945; HSP6 7.968 Bangkok, Thailand is listed as the correct call in the Berne list.

The Bruce Fahnestock South Sea Expedition was granted a permit for a special relay broadcast station of 1000 watts power aboard the schooner "Director II". Call assigned is KFAH and the frequencies to be used ar 4.7975, 6.425, 9.135, 12.8625, 17.310 and 23.100 mcs. The expedition will cruise for two years collecting bird groups and recording native music as well as making oceanographic studies for the U. S. Navy. This information was received from the FCC.

Norman Kreibel, Ambler, Pa. added his 130th country with a card from KB60CL on an old OM1TB card, also received cards from KA4RP, EA7BB, ZP3AC and XUIB. A veri was also received from CMY via CO2CB who advised that CMY was used for meteorological service, especially for hurricanes, etc., by Montserrat Observatory at Cienfuegos in conjunction with the observatory at Belen, Havana. When heard by Norm they were relaying a Eucharistic Congress under special permit with a special power of 500 watts.

From High Frequencies of February 25, 1940, XGOX 15.2CO Szechwan, China was heard R9 plus until sign-off at 0848 by Jimmy Hart; XGOY 11.900 Szechwan, China heard R9 plus by Earl Roberts at 0830......Al Rhoads reported Radio Saigon, Indo-China coming in well from 1030-1100.....MTCY 11.775 Hsinking, Manchukuo schedules Transmission I to Europe 1600-1650, Transmission II to Pacific North America and Hawaii 0130-0220 and Transmission III to China, Australia, South Seas 0950-1055 by Earl Roberts.....Jimmy Hart reported VUD-3 9.590 Delhi, India exceptionally good from 0700-0730....Al Rhoades reported that TAP 9.465 Ankara, Turkey mentioned that news in English is heard twice daily at 0715 from TAQ 15.195 and 1415 on TAP. Norm Kreibel reported that ZAA 6.084 Tirana, Albania has been heard good recently. United Air Lines Stations on 5.593 were heard by Charles Leboeuf. Also by Charles Leboeuf, PGGF 4.410 the SS Niew Amsterdam was heard in contact with Woo 4.735 mcs. Ocean Gate, N. J.

Frank Cole, Jr., Berkeley, Calif. is the first in the NNRC to report reception of Byrd's Antarctic Expedition on the evening of January 30, 1940. KC4USA was heard on about 14.15 mcs. at 2120-2130. M. W. Soplop writes that the Byrd Expedition is on the air with KC4USC, the Snow Cruiser. The operator mentioned he was using 125 watts to 8 wavelength single wire directed to New York with ECO between 14.140 and 14.152 mcs. For the best listening times it was between 2100-2200 before the band wert dead. Also M. W. said the ARRL was urging all USA hams to make no contacts with stations in Europe, especially those in or near the belligerent countries- D4, OK and YM have been heard on 20 and 40 CW lately.

A sample card was received from COCO Havana- a beautiful colored photo card showing the Capitol Building at night. Schedule was 0755 to 2330 weekdays.

A note after the BCB Foreign stations was made that the stations reported by Steve Mann were heard between 12/26/49 to 1/22/50. Stations reported by Evan B. Roberts were heard from 12/16/49 to 1/16/50. The medium wave stations tuned by Evan were on a Hammarlund Super-Pro SP-400-X and the Long Wave stations were on a 30-tube Scott Philharmonic. The antenna used was a Directional 400 ft. inverted L-50 ft. high with #12 solid copper wire. There were more stations reported by Evan than we have listed but space forbids listing them all.

Also in this issue it was reported that WWDC of Washington, D.C., a 24 hour station, had changed to 1260kcs. from 1450kc. This freed the 1450 channel of a 24-hour station.....WPAT-930 Paterson, N. J. a 24-hour station was reported to be silent on Monday mornings.

On June 20, 1970 members in and around Baltimore are looking forward to welcoming everyome who may be able to attend the annual Convention to be held in Maryland Patapsco State Park. Be sure to attend for a fine time.
