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THE PIONE R DAYS

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In our survey of the 1950s in the BCB Section for February 5, 1951, a report was received from Evan B. Roberts, Danvers, Massachusetts in which he described the reception of the European BCB and Long Wave stations. This report was three pages in length and, at that time, contained valuable information as to when to tune for these stations. Evan noted the peak times were between 1600-1900 and 2330-0400 EST. Perhaps, after 20 years, these times still are the best times to tune. It will be worth a try.

Charles P. Atherton, Exeter, N. H. DXed on January 7 and heard the following between 0145 and 0245: Paris-863; Prague-638; Lyons I- 602; Ottringham-1295; Rennes-791; Toulouse-944; Marseilles-674; Moorside Edge-692; Scotland-809; Wales-881; Brookmans Park-908; Bordeaux-1205 and Sofia-827......Steve Johnson, Havre de Grace, Md. listed the following TP stations: KGMB-590 Honolulu; KPOA-630 Honolulu; KULA-690 Honolulu; and KAHU-920 Waipahu, Hawaii. In the Broadcast Band section it was noted that February 19, 1951 marked the debut of a new Baltimore Station operating on 1400kcs., WWIN and on 24-hours a day. This was the frequency vacated by WCBM who moved to its new frequency of 680kcs.

THE PIONEER DAYS

The past few weeks letters have been received from two old-timers, namely, Joe Mauriello, Haskell, N. J. and Roy Utter of Succasunna, N. J. Both Joe and Roy reminesce about the Pioneer Days of DXing and excerpts from their letters follow.

In 1938, Joe lists the following catches: U3AZ on 14mc. in Moscow; UØNG in Venchnendsk, USSR; ZC6AQ on 14mc. in Palestine; XU8RB in Shanghai, China; and PK6XX the Expedition to Borneo. During 1942, 1943 and 1944 the following were logged: WAKF 1714kc. Everett, Mass; WPOP Philadelphia, Pa. on 2474kc.; WPOF New York City on 2450 and WPFH on 2414 Baltimore, Md. all police stations. On the Short Waves, Joe heard the following: Hungarian National Radio on 11.635mc.; Advance Press HQ in Naples on 4.830mc.; Vichy Radio, France on 9.575mc.; AFHQ Algeria on 16.025mc.; and TPC-5 in Paris on 15.240mc.

From Roy we have the following: From Pioneer Days, I read with interest that Hank Tyndall wrote as one of the old-timers and this has awakened another old-timer, the "Old Squire of Succasunna"..... To begin with back in 1922 when I wrapped severcoils of wire around a Quaker Oat Box and with one WD-11 tube and some other stuff I made a one-tube set that covered the 360 and 400 meter bands where all of the stations were then located. Some time later, when the frequencies were lengthened, I had to build another set, this time with a WD-12, a John L. Reinartz Coil and with it used to get out to KOA in Denver and KSL Salt Lake City on good nights. Then followed a 5 tube Freshman, a 5 tube Grebe and an 11 tube Philco. The old Philco gave out last year. I haven't DXed in several years, but I have never lost my interest in radio and the good old NNRC and my many friends made through the Club.

Speaking of old times, I find in my scrap books of early days some of the following from clippings: From the column "Broadcast Winnowed" in the Newark Evening News by the Dialist (Charlotte Geer) in 1928, a poem:

Comes now the season of my Great Content
As I dash home evenings on pleasure bent
For the air's chockful of distant waves
That I long to master and make my slaves
Winging away far out through the ether
Scanning away those waves meter by meter
Hopping all over- then finally the Coast
Ah'. That is waht pleases a DX hound most.

At the third meeting of the NNRC, President Cranse announced he would broadcast the Club aims and activities over WOR at 8:45 PM in a 15 minute talk. The principal talk at the meeting was given by Paul Godley, Technical Editor of the Newark Evening News and his subject was Tuned Antenna.....Then on March 24, 1928 the NNRC visited station 3XN at Whippany, N. J. On December 6, 1928, Paul A. Koher demonstrated Television in the Newark News Auditorium. I remember the screen size was about 4 inches, and people with round faces came through better than those with thin faces. On January 3, 1929, Leonard Cox's cast of Main Street of WOR with Don Carney and the rest of the cast entertained the Club. Also, Swanee Taylor gave his famous WOR "Snores and Sneezes", a wonderful show.....I also find that I became a member of the "Aural Order of the Hard Boiled Owl", a rubber eared-bird that preys on sleep, migrates winter Saturdays at midnight over station WAAM when Paul Godley ran a program from Cedar Grove, N. J. on DX. (To be continued in the next issue)

It has been a real pleasure to do this month's report, especially hearing from the old-timers Joe and Roy. We sincerely hope this reminescing will awaken some more of those who DXed years ago. We would like to hear from more of you. Best wishes.

We conclude the reminescing of the Pioneer Days by Roy Utter with Roy remembering the NNRC Dinner of February 21, 1929. Among the entertainers were the Landt Trio and White of WJZ, the Imperial Imps of WGCP and Amy Goldsmith of WEAF. Then on April 4, 1929, Norman Brokenshire of CBS was the guest. At the September, 1929 meeting we were entertained by Henry Burbig of the CBS program CE CO Courtiers. Running along to May 20, 1933, we find the one and only Kate Smith heading our entertainment. Also Jimmy Brierly, the Three Scamps, , the Hertz Brothers and Rosamond Cellini, a great show. (I can agree with you, Roy as I was fortunate enough to attend this one with our family at that time- it incidentally being our first) Then in May, 1934 another excellent show with Rudy Vallee, Morton Downy, Lanny Ross, Arthur Allen and Roger Bower of WOR as master of ceremonies. (This one is also remembered quite well as it occurred one month before we were married!). These were the good old days and fond memories of good times and many friends, like Irv Potts and Les Kraemer who have gone to their reward. Also in 1934 there was a headline in the column that the Vermont Director adds Good Ones to his List- Hank Tyndall listed 1152 verifications and reception of Fecamp, France and Turin, Italy Roy continues that it has been a joy reading several of his old scrap books and that he retired in April, 1969 after 47 years 3 months on the job. He is 67 now and enjoying life with gardening, lawn-mowing, travel and slides. In the winter he collects old Jazz, Tapes Jazz Music and Snowmobiles. Roy has a 25 HP Johnson Snowmobile and it is wonderful. Also all year long Roy enjoys the company of his 4 grandchildren.

In the March 11, 1940 issue, DX Qualifocations Chairman Joseph F. Smith gave the statistics on the NNRC Merit Band Wagon as follows: The Driver was Dave Thomas of Proctorville, Ohio with 2000 verifications. On Board was Henry Tyndall, Burlington, Vt., 1500 verifications; Ray E. Everly, Newton, Ill., 1100; Robert W. Botzum, Reading, Pa., 11.00; Carroll H. Weyrich, Baltimore, Md., 1100; Lloyd S. Hahn, Baltimore, Md., 1000; Mrs. Grace L. and Frank Simpson, Montclair, N. J., 1000; Mrs. F. W.Reitz, Ocean Grove, N. Y., 800; Louis Hahn, Rutherford, N. j., 800; Howard Kemp, Waterbury, Conn. 800; Peter J. McKenna, Newark, N. J., 600; Gus Magnuson, Providence, R. I., 400; Lawrence C. Reed, Wilmington, Del,, 200; Paul D. Jones, Jr., Bay Village, Ohio, 200; G. Elmer Klein, Baltimore, Md. 100; Frank Pytlak, Wallington, N. J. 100. This new merit certificate covered verifications on the Broadcast Band only.

In the March 18, 1940 issue, a report by Earl Roberts, Indianapolis, Indiana noted that March 3, 1940 was one of the finest mornings for the reception of Trans-Pacific stations. Earl noted that they were coming in so thick and fast that it was impossible to log all of them. The following were heard: 1YA at 2:25 AM; 3GI at 0610 with such volume it was though to be a North American station; 4YA-790 was R5-7 from 0400-0600; 2BL-740 peaked at R5; 2CO-670 at R4; and 2NR-700 at R4 shortly after 0500; 3AR was logged shortly after 0600 broadcasting a concert on 620; also 4QG-800, 2CY-850, 2YA-570, 3L)-770 and 3YA-720. Unidentified and weaker stations were on 580 and 760..... These stations would look good in many logs today.

In the Harch 26, 1940 issue, Phil Nichols volunteered the information that a lot of 15 minute tests were on the air on the fifth of the month or the first Tuesday. Many are on 1370 kcs. and begin at 0200. Some stations heard included WCOS, WG WGBR, WFTL, WSTP, WSAV and WMOB. Phil also noted that some of these tests are on the 7th day of the month also. Two logged were WHOP and KTEM..... Arthur J. Parfitt, Cleveland, Ohio noted that stations were testing for the Van Nostrand Engineering Service on the first Tuesday of each month until they were included in the Federal Communications Commission listing. The tests commenced at 0200.

From the April, 1951 issue, Director Walter I. Goldy of River Forest, Ill. wrote that he was having difficulty in getting verifications from the following stations: CMCA, XEFW, KFFA, KBUR, WCBS, WARD, KDTH and KOLT.

Also in this issue, Dixon W. Russell, Baltimore wrote that he was currently a Sergeant in the Korean conflict and that he was stationed on the central part of the front near the Han River which was, at that time, in the thick of the fight.

Carleton Lord wrote from Pittsburgh that he liked his new job with U. S. Steel very much and the NNRC wished him and Betty Lord every success in his new venture.

Also in the April 2, 1951 issue, Charles Martin wrote that his 2000th verification was received from WHOC and Editor Robert S. Knox commented on the fact that he would be a log time in reaching that plateau.

On the Broadcast Band the following stations were reported: PRG-9 Sao Paulo, Brazil-1100 on 2/22 from 0311-0440 by Gus Magnuson; KIFW Sitka, Alaska-1230 om 2/26 with a Frequency Check by Abe Cohon; HJAF Cartagena, Colombia on 1245 at 2010 by Steve Johnson; and KFRB Fairbanks, Alaska-1290 on 3/4 from 0445-0500 by Joe Enz.

Chairman Louis Hahn of the DX Qualifocations Committee reported the issuance of the following certificates: Silver Acc No. 54 to Roger Anderson, Arlington, Va. and Short Wave Traveler No. 29 to Edmun B. Richmond of Stamford, Connecticut.

In 1951 the name of the town Hot Springs, New Mexico was changed to Truth or Consequences. KCHS was the call of the radio station assigned to this town.

The month of April also saw station WWHG Hornell, N. Y. switch from 1590kc. to 1320kc. The reason for this switch was that the facilities of WLEA were purchased by WWHG and thus the call WWHG was transferred to the new frequency. This deleted the WLEA call as well as the permit of WWHG for 1590kc.

In the Short Wave section edited by Henry and Amelia Bennett, the following were reported: ZOY-15.340mc. Accra, Gold Coast by Chas. Sutton; BFEBS-15.300mc. Singapore in parallel with 11.880 with English Newscast by Grady Ferguson, Charlotte, NC and David Dary, Manhattan, Kansas; Manila, Philippines-15.298 at 2315 with a broadcast in Russian and promptly jammed on this frequency by Art Russell, Pasadena, Calif.; BED-3 Taipeh, Taiwan-15.235 in English 2300-2330 by Art Russell; Djedda, Saudi Arabia-11.950mc to s/off 2341 by Grady Ferguson; Karachi, Pakistan-11.725mc. by Grady Ferguson; ELBC Monrovia, Liberia-6.025mc relaying VOA programs by Grady Ferguson, David Dary and Ken Focht of Reading, Pa.; and CRFBU Radio Clube de Mozambique by Harold N. Wiber, Kansas City, Mo.

In the Amateur Section by Earl Roberts it was mentioned that CM9AA was in Guadeloupe and using the call FG7XA with a power of 60 watts on 20 meters. All QSLs were to be sent to CM9AA's home in Cuba.....John DeMyer said that FE8AA has been called and worked on 20 lately and this would be a new country....Another new one reported was VK9YT and he was believed to be on New Ireland....John DeMyer also reported that VTLAB, VTLAC and VTLAF in Kuwait were looking for "W" contacts between 0800-0900 EST.....Charles McCormick reported two new pefixes that will bear watching- DL9 for possibly a new zone in Germany and OKLØ which could be possibly some occupation forces in Czechoslovakia such as the OEL3 used by the American troops in Austria....The ARRL announced that the Saarland, 9S4 has been officially placed in the books as a new country.

This month we go back to the days of 1940 and, in the April 1 issue, we find an announcement of a new BCB All-Purpose Certificate. This certificate when issued will show progressive certification of one's BCB Dxing. Chairman Joseph F. Smith had all the details.

In the Members' Reports and Comments of the BCB, John T. Tweedie, Oakhurst, N.J. wrote that his DXing had been curtailed to a degree lately as every other week he worked midnite to 8 AM. His latest catches included PRA9; YVIRF; WFVA; WJPR; WHOP; WSAV; HJIAHN; WGNC; WENY; LRA; YVIRK; CMBH; WBAB; KVWC; CMKE; and CBR. John also heard VONF at 1730 located in St. John's, Newfoundland coming in strong.

Frank Pytlak, Wallington, N.J. wrote that his DXing for the season and the year is just about finished as he is now back on the midnite to SAM shift. The only time Frank would have to DX is on week-ends.

Reported in the High Frequencies column edited by Earl Roberts were the following: FZE8 17.280 Djibouti, French Somaliland by M. W. Soplop; DXS 15.160 Zeesen, Germany by Charles Leboeuf; YUE 11.735 Belgrade, Yugoslavia; DZD 10.530 Zeesen, Germany, a new one, by Earl Roberts; OFD 9.500 Lahti, Finland by Charles Leboeuf; ZRH 5.007 Johannesburg, South Africa by Steve Waring, California; YDA 4.900 Bandoeng, Java with programs similar to PLP by Earl Roberts; and ZQI 4.750 Kingston, Jamaica by Roger Legge.

S. C. Kellenberger, Chicago sent an interesting item from an NBC article. When the City of Flint arrived at Murmansk with a German prize crew aboard, the crew waited over 4 days for definite action of some sort. Then they learned the decision, but the news came from NBC. Listening to Lowell Thomas, easily heard in Murmansk via shortwave radio, a news flash was heard that the German crew would be returned to the ship and allowed to leave for Germany. Twenty five minutes later the German crew boarded the Flint. The news was learned by an NBC representative in Murmansk, sent to Radio City via RCA Communications and given to Lowell Thomas who put the item on the air so fast it reached the City of Flint before the Germans returned to take possession."

Art Parfitt wrote that his only reports out were to Tripoli, Libya and Paris, France. He repoted that he had heard all continents this winter and that Tripoli is the only veri to make his VAC.

Reported in the April 22, 1940 issue on the High Frequencies were: KRTK 17.310 West Base, Little America testing with WGEO, WGG and WEL. Schedule is for 2200 EST on either 17.310 or 12.862 as reported by Earl Roberts and M. W. Soplop; CR7BG 15.285 Lourence Marques, Mozambique is beamed daily to America from 0700-0800 by Mrs. Mary Page; RV96 15.180 Moscow, USSR with RKI 15.040, RNE 12.000 and RAN 9.600 announcing in English at 2030 by Earl Roberts; KRTK 12.862 West Base, Little America heard 4/9/Canton Island talking to KVZJ Jarvis Island by Earl Roberts; NIQ 7.995 Johnston Island verified via airmail postmarked from the USS Quail by Earl Roberts; and ZAA 6.084 Tirana, Albania verification received in 6 weeks by Roger Legge and M. W. Soplop.

At the annual meeting of the Club on April 26, 1940 the following officers were elected: President, Irving R. Potts; Vice Presidents Arthur E. Foerster, Earl R. Roberts, George H. Jacobs, Henry T. Tyndall, Lloyd S. Hahn, Lester W. Kraemer, William H. Applegate and Louis Hahn; Canadian Vice President, George H. Goodwill; Executive Secretary, Peter J. McKerra; Asst. Executive Secretary, John Sanderson; Treasurer, William H. Schweitzer, and Francial Secretary, Joseph F. Smith.

Deleted was WSAL Salisbury, Md.

In the June 15, 1940 issue of the High Frequencies it was noted that the FCC has cracked down on the American amateur stations. The following restrictions apply: No foreign station may be contacted from now on. Only the United States and its territorial possession may be worked. Only American citizens operating stations may be worked. The English language shall be used exclusively. The only DX left for the US ham is the Philippines, Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Alaska, Hawaii and Islands in the Pacific Ocean and Little America.

On the Broadcast Band, Phil Nichols, East Hartford, Conn wrote that the only verification back in a long time was from XEZ with a nice card....Jack Schneider, Garwood, N. J. said that recent attempts at DX netted poor results, but his latest additions are WKST, WISE, WPIC, WJLS and WCAR for a total of 1023....Art Parfitt's DXing the morning of April 23 included 1YA, 2YA, 3YA, 2YC, 3GI, 3LO, KGFJ and KHBC all with fair volume.

Jack Goodrich wrote about warning our members of the dangers of the questionnaires that JZJ-Tokyo was sending their listeners. Jack mentioned that the one he received asked the location where and kind, etc. An International Reply Coupon was enclosed for return postage. The cards requesting the information were punched for filing purposes

In High Frequencies of July 15, 1940, the latest bulletin from the Australian DX Club called attention to something that noe of us in America have thought about. The habit of SWL's in swapping cards and filling in station data such as 'Signal recd R9/QSA5' in place of card or letter acknowledgement caused concern for the Australian authorities. This is in view of the fact that all stations in the British and French Empires and also many other countries have been closed down for the duration of the war. When the card was sent through the mails, the authorities thought that an unlicensed transmitter was operating by the recipient of the card with the result that many SWL's receiving the cards from overseas were called on to give explanations to the authorities.
