In the High Frequencies section edited by Jimmy Hart, it was announced that all amateurs could be on the air effective November 15, 1945. All frequencies that were formerly available for amateur transmissions with the exception of 112-115.5 mcs. could be used now. The frequencies 112-115.5 mcs. were to be tunred over for air navigation use.

It was also announced that station WWV of the National Bureau of Standards in Washington was inaugurating a new service. It is now possible to get the correct time 24 hours a day as every 5 minutes the EST will be given in code. This service is on four frequencies—15, 10, 5 and 2.5 mcs. It is thus possible for listeners to calibrate their receivers.

Some unusual calls reported in the High Frequencies section were: PreY-10, Press Wireless, Manila on 18.56mcs. by Paul Dilg, California; WVLC-18.53 believed to be a ship in Tokyo waters and used with JAG-17.40mcs. and JZK-15.16 mcs. also by Paul Dilg. Also PMC Free Indonesian Forces in Indonesia (Java) on 18.135 mcs. by Charles Sutton. Charles Sutton also reported KULM-7.680 mcs. U. S. S. Iowa calling KEB and KES-2. Excerpts from this articles are quoted as follows: "November, 1945 was a milestone in radio for in that month radio broadcasting celebrated its 25th anniversary." Do you rember in the early 1920s, the Silver Masked Tenor who today is still with NBC, although no longer on the air?...Do you remember when all radio stations in the East had to sign-off upon the flashing of and SOS? When this occurred at night, DX hounds found plenty of stations to add to their logs.... Do you remember the famous Cliquot Club Eskimos who wore polar bear skins during the program and played in a setting of arctic scenery?.....Do you remember the first program dedicated to the Newark News Radio Club by station XEN, Mexico City, Mexico? Do you remember the "Broadcasts Winnowed" radio column conducted by Charlotte Geer in the Newark Evening News? And do you recall that it was through her DX experiences that appeared in her column that the NNRC was organized?.... A poem by Mrs. Geer was:

Some may rave of McNamee,
Some may drool of Ted:
Some may say that Rudy
pains them in the head.
But the lad who's dearest
of all the lads I know
Is the boy who blithely chirps
"This is KGO."

Do you remember the first scheduled broadcast from KDKA, Pittsburgh with the results of the Harding-Cox election on November 20, 1920?.....Do you know that the oldest commercial program on the air is the Cities Service Concert Hour?....Do you know that DX reception is at its best when the moon is in the first or last quarter?.... Do you remember the first radio sets when listeners around the family table had to wait their turn to pick up the earphones?....And do you know that the man responsible for all this- Marconi- invented the wireless in 1896?"

Barney Ahman, Baltimore, Md. acquired a 1924 EKKO stamp album with stamps of that date and before 1930 at a stamp auction to add to his historical collection. Some of the stations represented by EKKO stamps were KFUM Colorado Springs, Colo.; WCAP Washington, D. This past month a letter was received from Clarence D. Henry, 657 Weymouth Road, Mays Landing, N. J. 08330 and it was indeed a pleasure to hear from him and his description of his experiences during the Pioneer Days of Radio. Clarence writes as follows: "I learned the code in 1915 copying NAA and ships at sea. There was no radio at that time, it was wireless. My first rig was the old sliding coil and the Galena Cat Whisker. My second rig was the 3-Honey-comb coils and the small DeForrest Cabinet with two tubes. Also a cigar box full of flashlight batteries soldered together for the B batteries. For the A battery I had a leaky storage battery which ruined my Mother's new rug. My antenna was a 100 ft. Long Wire fastened on the top of a 100 ft. water tower and down to my home on a 45° angle. This antenna was excellent in the wintertime, but in the summer the static almost deafened your ear-drums. I heard the first voice that KDKA ever sent out which was quite an experience. By the way, I learned the Morse code as a messenger boy and this made it easy for me to learn CW. I was an SWL in 1915. In the event anyone has an old call book, my two buddies were 3SL, Frank Gallo (now silent key) and 3IE, Howard Schenk whose call is now K2AZ"..... Many thanks to you Clarence for sending in your experiences in the Pioneer Days, it was most interesting reading of them.

I hope the above letter from Clarence Henry will be a preview of those I hope to receive from some of the Pioneers of the NNRC. Please write of your experiences in the early days of radio. They will make most interesting reading.
