In the Amateur Section edited by Earl Roberts some interesting notes were mentioned pertaining to Amateur Stations. Amateurs in Korea may only operate cw between 14.000-14.400 and 28.000-29.700 mcs.; Class A phone may only use 14.150-14.200 if the transmissions are directed to the United States and for general operation in the band 14.200-14.300. Class B phone is limited to 28.100-29.500 mcs...Icelandic amateurs are assigned calls with the prefix TF followed by a number from 1-6 depending on the district in Iceland, followed by two letter if fixed, 3 if working portable. Maximum power 50 watts, frequencies for cw-14.020-14.380; 28.000-29.700, phone 28.000-29.700. Amateurs in Japan also may use the range from 14.150-14.200 mcs. provided communication is directed to the homeland of the operator; i.e. - GI's to America; Australians directed only to Australia, etc ... The powers that be in Iraq have forbidden the use of service equipment on the ham bands, stations being affected are YI2CA, YI2AT, 2AH, 2KP and 2JJ, so chances of hearing a YI became mighty slim.

In the February 15, 1948 pages "Leaves From A Dxer's Scrapbook edited by Carl Lord noted that it was 15 years ago that DXing received a potent shot in the arm. Up to that time, reception in this country had been generally limited to stations on the North American continent and the nearby islands. It was tru that West Coast listeners regularly dialed stations in Asia and the Antipodes, and occasionally a TP trickled East to be logged by a lucky DXer. On rare occasions an Eastern listener was able to span the Atlantic. During the early morning hours of Friday, December 2, 1932, a number of listeners picked up a station between 910 and 920 kcs. which was broadcasting what was to become a most notable sporing event in DX history. This was one of the international cricket matches played in Australia between teams representing that country and Great Britain.

The first published reports of this broadcast appeared in the January 1933 issue of Radex, which had gone to press three days after the broadcast was heard. Charles Leboeuf, North Grosvenordale, Conn., Derek Wharton, Rye, N. Y., and Paul Staude of Souderton, Pa. were sure they heard a cricket match but could not identify the station. Douglas Wauchope, Decatur, Ga. reported that the announcer mentioned the heat of the day and he looked for rainfall before night. At 2 a. m. EST this would be midafternoon in Australia. Because of the number of reporters, Radex presumed that the program had been relayed by an American station.

The guessing game continued and P. J. Hauss of Indianapolis thought it was 4RK in Rockhampton because it came in as the Australians usually do. L. E. Wallace, Tallahassee, Fla. commented the announcers had marked British accents. Radex credited to the first likely tip to Bill Vornkahl, Westport, Conn. who wrote that the station was a Canadian because the announcer said the reports were heing read from cables and that we were hearing them a few minutes after the plays were made, Bill's guess was that it was CFQC at Saskatoon.

A lone wolf among reporters that month was Earl Roberts, then living in Cambridge Chio, who claimed it was Poste Parisien in Paris. Radex doubted this because of the number of reporters and suggested that, if it was a foreign station, it more than likely was one of the Australians.

By the time the March Radex hit the stands, it looked as though Poste Parisien was confirmed as the mystery station. Earl Roberts produced the first verification. R. R. Rawstron, Claremont, N. H. and Stanley Nevin, South Hadley Center, Mass. seemed to clinch the point when they forwarded letters from the sponsors of the broadcast, Fleming and Whitelaw, Australia House, London. They wrote that Poste Parisien was the station and the results were being read from cables despatched by a commentator in Australia.

The same issue of Radex acknowledged that reception of the cricket matches. In addition to the DXers mentioned, listeners reporting the broadcast included Warren Snyder, Washington, D. C.; Charles L. Dies their first taste of mass reception of a TA station, the April issue of Radex exploed a minor bombshell with the news that 4RK was also verifying reception of the same cricket matches.C. I. Boyer, Darby, Pa.; H. R. Kenney, Camden, N.J.; and L. G. Briscoe, Montreal; and P. J. Hauss all received 4RK veries. However, they were convinced they had heard Poste Parisien. (Continued in August)

Continuing Carl Lord's "Leaves From A Dxer's Scrapbook" comments on the reception of Postae Parisien in the July issue, the general concensus seemed to be that both 4RK and Poste Parisien had broadcast the matches, the former on 910 kcs. and the latter on 914 kcs. It is highly probable that reports of reception of one station would have been confirmed by the other and vice versa. Listeners with accurately calibrated receivers could have spotted the difference in frequency, and some DXers undoubtedly heard positive identifications. But in the minds of many there probably remains to this day a reasonable doubt as to which ocean had been actually spanned.

The famous cricket matches earned one lasting credit, Dxers were convinced that reception of foreigh stations - and particularly the Europeans - no longer was a happy accident. Listeners began to tune the spots where the TA's should be heard, and reception of TA stations was claimed on an increasing number of reports in DX journals. In a single issue of Radex, shortly after the reception of Poste Parisien, Dxers reported reception of Dresden, Frankfurt-am-Main, Stuttgart, Heilsburg, Prague, Langenberg, Hamburg, Gleiwitz, Leipzig, Nuremberg, Barcelona, Horby, Trieste, Rome, Paris, Algiers and five British stations.

The cricket matches were heard at an ppportune time. Reception of foreign stations reaced a never-to-be-forgotten peak between 1932 and 1935, and those who dialed trans-oceanic frequebcies generally were well rewarded. The memory of thise exciting days gave encouragement to old-timers who were currently bogged down beneath channel hogs and blasts of static, for history has a habit of repeating itself.
