Carl Foerstieri, New York, N. Y: "WEMP, 1310 kcs., Milwaukee, is now on the air. I heard them testing the morning of October 13 from 0200 to 0300. Reception seems to be falling off lately with static improving instead of diminishing. Enjoyed our October 11 meeting and am now awaiting Silver Ace certificate No. 12, with 801 verifications."

Leo Herz, Berwyn, Ill.: Received my bulletin and think it VFB. Since I haven't sent in a report for a long time, I am doing so now. As I wrote you previously, I have a new receiver- a six-tube Echophone, all waver, and with it I have increased my log total to 508; a far cry from the 236 I had when I joined the club. Of the former number, 315 are BCB stations, 43 are short wavers and 115 are hams including X1G and the Cuban, 8YB. My foreign short wave log includes GSC, EAQ, HJ1ABE, HJ4ABE, HJ4ABA, COCD, CGRX, CGRO, XECR, XEBJQ, COH, XEBT, TIPG, CEC, PRADO, HJ1ABG, HJ1ABB, CWG, VK2ME, FYA, GSB and DJB to which, incidentally, I am listening right now and will send them a report and my German will come in very handy. I will gladlylet you know, for members' information, when the various stations come in best. Have not done much BCB Dxing- only new ones are KRNT, WBNX and wBBR."

Earl S. Roberts, Indianapolis, Ind.: "In a veri from KIUL, Garden City, Kansas, they state that they run DX programs the second Wednesday of each month. Recently logged KROC and WEMP to bring my total to 1167 of which 1001 are BCB stations."

Louis J. McVey, Sparrows Point, Md.: "I now have a new 116B Philco and with it can pull in as many as 50 stations at noon. So far, it has been too noisy here for any real DX although I have heard 1YA, PRB9, LS2, YV1RC and Rennes, France loud as KNX the morning of October 5 at 0100. Dudley Clarke, Montreal, Que.: "I have finally passed the 500th station and the call was the elusive KOH, Reno, Nev. I have been trying to get that one for two years and believe me, I sure was glad to log it and strangely enough, I came across it accidentally. My log total is now 509 and the following are new ones: wTOC, wGAL, wCOP, wPAR, wRAX, wMFF, KOH, wJMS, wMFO, wJIM, KFYO, wQBS, KTRH, wCHS, KROC and wDNC. I now have 263 veries with twnety reports out for confirmation. On October 4 I got up.at the unearthly hour of 6 AM and succeeded in logging and getting enough material for a veri from VK3ME. That makes two Aussies I have logged on Sw but the BCB stations in that country just simply won't dribble into my log."

James A. Dunigan, New Britain, Conn.: "Just thought i Would get off a few words to the gang and let them know I am still on deck and getting up steam for the season at hand. New catches so far this season are WELI, wLEU, wGAL, CKNX, KPCB, WCOL, WCOP, WRDO and KLRA. Veries are in from wBL, wRDO, KWKH, KLRA, wGAL, WNBR, WLEU and WRAW. General conditions, so far, have been bad to say the least. Old man static comes in about R-9; however, until he lays off I suppose I'll have to grin and bear it. Best of luck to all NNRCers."

Russell N. Johnson, Saskatoon, Sask.: "I am glad to say that I am the busiest I have been in months and as a result my DXing has been confined to the monthly frequency checks; however, I have added nine new ones- WBNO, KHSL, KADA, WKBZ, WSUN, WFLA, WNBC, KWV and WNEW to bring my log up to 713. The latter, if it had not been for the extreme static, would really have been an easy catch. And speaking of static, I don't ever remember when it has been worse, an especially for this time of the year. Of course, the weather up here has been acting crazily. Recently, we started the day with pouring rain, by noon it was a blizzard, and by night everything was frozen up. It stayed that way for two days and then suddenly warmed up and now we have summer weather. So you see, one day it means fur-lined underwear and the next, bathing suits."

milliam Benz, St. Louis, Mo.: "Greetings to all my fellow members! DXed for CJLS, on for us from 2 to 3 AM, the morning of October 6 and also for KGKO, mitchita Falls, but it was impossible to hear their signals but I sent thank-you letters to both. Incodentally, I will write to all stations transmitting for us and thank them for their programs. Tried for mMFO the morning of October 12 and found their frequency all messed up with whistles and howls, due to the many stations on at that time. One was a Spaniard and one was I suppose, MMFO, but couldn't bring either through. Reception the morning of October 13 was poor and when I tried for KID and CKOV could only get the former. I did hear mJBO and CMBX though. Sydney, Australia is beginning to come in now via the short wave; heard them well October 13."

Samuel A. Tucker, Bluff, (Via Nome), Alaska: "Just received my membership card and emblem and sure am glad to be a member of the Newark News Radio Club. You must bear in mind that when writing to me it takes a very long time to get up here and for mail to go out. Now for a word about my DX-ing. I started September 26. California stations come in here from 5 to 9 PM, Alaskan time and the New Zealanders and Australians from 7 to 11 PM. The best ones are KJFO, 2YA, KFRC, 5CK, KFI, 1YA, KPO, WLW, 3YA, KGU, 3LO, KLX, KROW, KNX, KSL and KGMB. The latter and KGU are good every night. During the Winter, when the dyas are short, I can pick up England, France and Germany on the broadcast band from & AM to 1 PM. From 10 AM to 1 PM is usually the best time; then I usually receive four or five from England, two or three from France and five or six from Germany."

Mrs. Dora Newcomb, Cxnard, Calif.: "XEFL, Toajuana, Mexico is now operating 24 hours a day. As nearly as I can figure they are on 1160 kcs. Reports should be sent to them at San Diego, California. XEC, Tiajuana is on 1170 kcs., but I believe they are only on the air from 2 to 10 PM PST. Slowly the 24-hour stations are taking us."

James E. Hill, Toronto, Ontario: "On October 10 I received a nice letter from Senor Robert Valezzi of XEWZ, thanking me for my report of last season and asking me to notify all NNRC members that he has installed an office for the purpose of answering reports of reception. Since this has put him to great expense, he says he will have to ask 10¢ for verifying correct reports promptly. Senor Valezzi also states that he will open a new station November 1- XEB2, 820 kcs., and those reporting it and enclosing 25¢ will recive a surprise souvenir. The new veries of XEWZ and XEBC are the finest any Mexican has issued yet. While I have started this season fairly well with 40 reports out, I haven't done much on real diatance so far. Veries are slow coming back but they are picking up now. I find that as a result of checking Radex for October, I need 15 w's including the new . ones. New catches verified are WNBC, KPLC, KIUN, WMFG, WCDP, WELI, WNFD, KRUC, WMFF, CKNX, CKSO and KHSL. My log is going up and I hope to get that Silver Ace certificate soon. ."

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From the pages of Vol. 1, No. 7, the Members' Reports and Comments included reports from the following:

Director Cappie T. Hadley, Nashville, Tenn., "Our WLAC DX periods have finally reached across the Atlantic. W. J. Hambly, London, England heard us October 6, 1935. Since September 1, I have received veries from KVOL, KFRO, WTMV, KWTN, WJBO, WNBC, KOTN, WLNH, WRGA, WOC, WMFN, WAIM, WCMI, WMAS and WPAY."

Sanford Morris, Metuchen, N. J.: "The club's weekly bulletin is a wow! I am preparing a folder to hold the copies in order of their issuance. My Philco 16X which I have had about six months is working swell. I have about 700 stations at present, hams included. I read in RADEX that some DXer had 5300 stations, including amateurs, and I am trying to duplicate or better his feat. My log, compiled in the last three months, includes all continents, except Africa, on the short waves and forty-six of the forty-eight stateson the broadcast band. I have about 150 verifications received in previous years and of these are thirty 2000 milers. I started DXing in 1927 and all of it has been done on the loud speaker. My first veri of the 1935-1936 season was KID, Idaho Falls, Idaho. I am now using Pete McKenna's double postcard veries and like them very much. And, it only costs 2 cents for each veri."

Jimmy Dunigan, New Britain, Conn.,: "My recent confirmations have come from WBBL, WMMN, KFJB, CMCA and FNSK, call of the S. S. Normandie, and I am very proud of the last one. You're right about noisy reception; it has been here about R9 plus."

Andrew Hill, Red Bank, N. J.: "DXing sure has been slow here so far this season. Static level has been so high it has been possible to hear only a few distant stations. However, I was up the morning of October 25 and heard KADA and WJBK. Verifications are just as slow; to date I have sent out seventeen reports and have received replies from only seven. Will have a complete report for you real soon."

Nancy Lee Saxton, Joplin, Mo.: "I like the new bulletin very much and believe all members will feel the same way about it. It contains so much news and other interesting information. I have only been able to DX a few nights so far but I have added WJBK, already verified, and WPAR who have not as yet answered. Last February I logged WKBV and just recently received their veri. My veries now total 447 and my heard log 662. I want to end up this season with 800 stations and 600 verifications; that shouldn't be impossible."

Director John J. Baxter forwarded the following information on the TAs:
The French PTT are going ahead with their Television plans. A 10KW transmitter is to be erected atop the Eiffel Tower in Paris. Although it is expected that the erection of this transmitter will take at least six months, transmissions should go on sooner as a temporary station is brought into service. A wavelength of 7 meters is to be used and pictures are scheduled to be of 180 lines.

A 10 KW station has been opened at Pietermaritzburg, South Africa to relay the Durban transmissions. The call is ZTP and the frequency 697 Kc.

PTT, Nice, France is now testing nightly with 1185 kcs. Announcements are in English and French. For an interval signal they are using a few bars of the song "The Dance of the Cuckoos." At sign-off time the entire recording of the number is played.

There is talk that the Soviets are to build a 2,500,000 watt transmitter at Chadnika to satisfy their ambition to own the world's most powerful broadcasting station.

The new Italian station at Bolzano will use 20 KW instead of 10 KW as announced previously.

This just about takes care of this issue and we would like to hear from you as to what you would like to have presented in this section. I do have all of the bulletin issues from Vol. 1, No. 1 through the last one prior to going to the present format.

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From the pages of Vol. 1, No. 8 dated November 18, 1935, a pertinfact was directed to DXers' attention by Vice President Frank Scott who stated that the growing tendency of broadcasting stations to hog the air with all-night programs of canned music and advertising stunts should be viewed with alarm by all disciples of DXing.

He volunteered that according to Radex there were 856 stations operating on 102 channels from 530 to 1550 kilocycles and of that number, 335 or 39.1 per cent are more or less interfered with by twelve 24 hour

stations listed in the following table:

KTM. 780 kcs., voids that channel for 11 others on that frequency WHN. 1010 kcs. 14 4 KJBS, 1070 kcs. 40 KGFJ 1200 kcs., 54 .. EDC 1210 kcs., WNEW 1250 Kcs., 8 KFAC 1300 kcs., 10 ..EXL 1310 kcs., 53 50 KRE 1370 kcs., 1380 kcs., AMC ... 11 50 KuGC 1420 kcs., 35 .. Jak 1500 kcs.,

Director E. L. Peters of Westport, Nova Scotia writes: "I have probably one of the most unique verifications ever issued-PRF4, 923 kcs., Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. In addition to the personal letter, they sent me a copy of 'Jornal do Brasil' containing a photostatic copy of my complete report, followed by an actual transcription of their station log for the period reported. This checked in minute detail with my report which included ten selections, nearly all by title, and times given were accurate to the minute. This station was reported September 12 and verified October 29. I have reports out to PRB9 and PRA6. Any of these stations can be heard practically every evening. PRF4 signs off at 2100 EST."

From the Members' Reports and Comments Section of the November 25, 1935, the following were received:

Birely Ross, Dallas, Texas: "We have just had a little cold weather down this way and DX is somewhat better; however, static is still bad but the stations seem to override it. Recent new ones are WPAR, WTAL, XEFZ, WSJS, MAIM, K4V, WCMI, CMBC, KNEL, KGNC, WKAR, WMFG, WTEL, WLEU, KIRO and the following TPs: 2UE, 2KY, 4BC, JOGK, 4RK and 2UW. I heard 17 Japanese the morning of November 7 but they were all talking in Japanese and I could not get enough verifiable material. When they did start to play music the U.S. stations came on the air. That was a peculiar night; the down-under stations could not be heard while the Japanese and Chinese were all over the dial. JOHK, JOBK-2 and JOAK-2 came through with good speaker volume. I expect to put up a 300 foot antenna soon to replace my present 75 foot one that is now being used."

Frank A. Hoxie, South Orrington, Maine, "Reception hasn't been so good recently although I have heard 1YA. Latest foreign verifications are from 3HA and 2UW; others are WMAW, WFBM and CKNX. I think the club's bulletin is very fine."

Leo Herz, Berwyn, Ill., "At last DX is better. WKAR and CMCY are new ones for me."

This just about does it for now and we wish everyone a pleasant spring and summer and if you continue to DX during the warmer months may you hear many new stations.

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In the Members' Reports and Comments section of the December 9th, 1935 issue, the following were received:
Nicholas J. Hock, Newark, N. J. reported reception of CFRC, CKSO, WMFR, WNOX, WIS and WKZO. On the Short Waves, HI-1L on 40 meter fone and TI-1R on 10 meters. He also logged HRN rebroadcasting WLW on November 24.

John T. Tweedie, Cakhurst, N. J.: "While I got off to a slow start this season, I am now picking up speed and have thus far recorded the following stations: NLEU, WPAR, WJBL, WNBC, WELI, KXYZ, CMCF, CMHX, KGNC, KVOL, WJBO, KIUN, WMFO, XEWZ, CHGS, CKNX, LR-3, LR-8, Toulouse, WMFD and CFRC. I find the Cubans and South Americans have good signal strength although it is hard to bring them in between the stations in this country. I believe that if some specials could be arranged with the South Americans during the early morning hours many DXers could log them. I am corresponding with our Venezuelan director, Jesus Ma. Lander Garcia of Caracas. The old Philco 92, almost four years old, is still going strong."

Don Hill, Broken Eow, Neb.: "I did quite a bit of DXing during the November checks and landed fourteen new ones- WCPO, WCAP, WTNJ, WOC, WCMI, KPAC, KIUL, WIRE, KABR, WKBA, KIUL, WPAY, KPLC and KNOW. Since then I have added KGNC, KIRO and KABG. Verifications have arrived from WTMV, KGFX, WCPO, WCAP, WCMI, WTBJ, KIDW, WKBA, KPAC, KPLC, KABR, KWTN and WKAR. Art Foerster, Indianapolis, Ind.: "The following verifications were received this fall: WCPO, WCOP, KGNC, CKNX, CKCV, KPAC, KLO, WTMV, WCBS, KABR, WNBC, KHSL, WNOX, KFBB, KVOL, WPAR, CKSO, WLLH, WLNH, KROC, KWBG, and KRNT for a total of 688 verified and I still have letters out to WTAL, WMFO, KIRO, KIEM and XEFL."

Lloyd Hahn, Baltimore, Md.: "DX has picked up nicely during the past ten days and I think we are due for a busy season. My latest have been XEWZ, WMFF, WTMV, KIRO, WMFR, WSVA, CMCQ and WPAR. Only recent verues from KPLC, WLEU and KRNT."

Earl Roberts, Indianapolis, Ind. "Using a Hallicrafter Super Seven, I recently ran over the short wave band and heard a station calling: Hello America, Hello New York. This is Addis Ababa calling the Columbia Broadcasting Co.' The frequency was 11.98 mcs. and signals were R-5, QSA-5. Also logged JVM Tokyo from 11:50 P.M. to midnight, CST, November 18 with announcements in English. Received a station on 625 kcs., November 19, 7 to 8 P.M. CST at which time they signed off. Al Bartholomew, Bradford, N. Y.: "My 800th verification has come home to roost and, as I already had the necessary 100-2000 milers, I am hereby making official application for the Silver Ace Certificate. My new Kent is sure going places this fall and I have some fine reports out-- 1YA, 3YA, 4YA, 2NC, 2KY, and 3GI. The morning of November 7 was a banner one for me as I was able to report to 4BC, 2CH, 2UW and 2GB. Letters have gone to LR3, YV1RC, XEWZ, CJRM, KIT, KWKC, KIUP, KSFO, WCOP, WMFO, KGNC, KVSO, WSFA, WHBB and KLX. At present I need but 29 active stations in the U. S. and hope to 1pp a few of them in the near future. Verifications since my last letter-- CKNX, CKCV, KIRO, KHSL, KRNT, KIUN, KWBG, KIUL, KROC, WSVA, WPAR, WCPO, XEFL and CFCF."

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From the pages of Vol. 1, No. 16 dated January 13, 1936, the following members reported through the Members' Reports and Comment:

Nick Hock, Newark, N. J.: "I recently added XEAF, XEFL, JIUJ, KVOL, WPFB, and verified WCOP, XEU, WMFF, KGNC and WMFJ. The morning of December 22 was one of the best of the season. Rennes, Bordeaux, Normandie and Leipzig came through."

Ben Feinstein, Newark, N. J .: "Just to let you know that I have reached and passed the 600 mark and am setting my goal at 650 for this season. New ones are WELI, WKBB, WORL, KWTO, CKSO while veries are in from WDNC, WGPC, WPHR, WAGF, WHEF, WMAS, WABY, WLEU, WMFF, WIRE, CKCH, XERA and WPAR. My log now stands at 604 heard and 560 verified. Best wishes for success to all the newly-elected officers of the club. I know they will do everything possible for a bigger and greater NNRC."

Lloyd Hahn, Baltimore, Md .: "Well, I got those 15 stations I was after, but boy what a lot of sleep I lost: Here they are: WHBB, WMFF, KHSL, KGFL, KFRO, KVSO, KVOL, WPAY, WCPO, WMFG, WNBC, CKNX, WTAL, KWTN and CKCV. In addition to reporting to them, I also wrote to 14 other stations that were on for our club."

Do you remember old PCJ, the Netherlands which came on the air back in 1927? Well, this old favorite is shortly to resume broadcasting on 31.28 meters or 9590 kcs.

Work is progressing rapidly on Radio Normandie's new high-power transmitter. The foundation stone was recently laid by M. Mindel, Minister of the French PTT at Louvetot.

You can now identify Leipzig, Germany, 785 kcs., by its interval signal of three chords in D major, played on an electrical music box.

CT1GL Parede, Portugal, has been silent for some time. The transmitter was partly destroyd by fire but the Radio Club of Portugal, owner, got busy at once and CTIGL is back on the air. Incidentally, this station broadcast a number of fine programs for the NNRC last season.

In the High Frequencies section edited by Earl Roberts for January 20, 1936 the following were reported under the "Hams": Oscar Havlin of Indianapolis almost fell off his chair when he tuned in ON4CSL, Labendai, Belgian Congo. This rare catch was heard January 4 at 2 PM on 14.410 mcs. talking to a Rossville, N. Y. amateur.... If you haven't as yet tuned in Alaska, try for K7DH, Juneau near 14.2 mcs. around 9 PM....HJ1Z is being heard on 14 mcs. at 7:30 AM and we are wondering if this is a new station or HK1Z with a new call Eric Butcher, Cokeville, Wyo. is the second member to report the new Greenland station NX2Z in Hochstetter. Mort Meehan , Elizabeth, N. J. states that NX2Z is owned by the Danish Geographical Survey, uses 1450 watts and first took the air December 28.... Eric Butcher has also heard ZE1JR, HH2B and XE20FR ... Nick Hock submits these catches: VP2CD, 14.12 mcs., 8:30 AM; VK2NO, 14.312 at 7:30 AM; G6XR, 14.10 mes at 7:34 AM; and XE1BD 7.264 at 11:11 PM.

FCC Changes included new calls assigned as follows: KBIX Muskogee, Okla.; WJNO West Palm Beach, Fla.; WSPR Springfield, Mass.; and WTHT Hartford, Conn.... Effective date of Brooklyn cases was postponed to Feb. 18. In the event the Brooklyn Daily Eagle's station goes on the air, the call will be WEGL....KWEA Shreveport, La. was granted permission to remain silent from February 1 to March 31, 1936.

Hank Tyndall, Burlington, Vt.: "The bulletin is getting better every issue. Wonder what is going on down in the Argentines: LS2, LR4 and LR5 blasted their way in the morning of December 26. Heard and enjoyed Mrs. Obert's talk over WELI."

Earl Roberts, Indianapolis, Ind.: "CMBY blotted out every one on 640 kcs., December 26, while CMK on 725 even covered the 730 channel. WELI and WCOP have verified. Veries from LR3, Frankfurt, CMCF, CMHX, Rennes, CRCV, Bordeaux, KIUJ, Toulouse, W6XAI and CKSO."

In the February 3, 1936 issue (Vol. 1, No. 19), a report from our Executive Secretary. Milt says: "Just to remind members that one of the officers still has a radio set I submit this report of my DXing the morning of January 30. That morning was perfect for reception and the Argentinians came through with no trouble. The Cuban on 790 is definitely CMGH Matanzas. Heard verifiably, these west coasters which were new for me: KFSD, KMTR, KMJ, KEX and KFBK. Logged KMMJ on what I think was their final special program. Could not get a rise out of the Europeans even with good DX although I was able to get them after the last Board meeting on a very rainy and noisy night.

Also, in the February 3, 1936 our energetic director, Ray Everly, suggested and appropriate slogan for the NNRC. The slogan suggested was "THE PIONEER DX CLUB."

Art Foerster, Indianapolis, Ind. reports Radio Normandie. KGU, CMOX, XEAQ, CMHX, TIPG, WCMI, WELI, WRC, WMFR, KIUJ, KLRH, CMBZ and CMK. Earl Roberts says Art is showing some improvement in his DXing and believes he will eventually get out of his backyard.

Dud Clarke, Montreal, Que. has gotten his share of the South Americans-LR1, LR4, LR5 and LS2. Dud almost fell off his chair December 26 when he tuned to 990 kcs., heard some Spanish music and then LR1's announcement. During the period January 4, 1935 and December 28, 1935, and on 57 mornings of DXing, Dud added 95 new ones-- 3 Canadians, 5 Mexicans, 7 Cubans, 2 in Argentina, 1 in Haiti and 77 in the U.S. His log now totals 552 stations with 318 verified and 23 2,000 milers. Reports are still out to 21 stations.

The Argentines sure had some kick January 9. HIX with their NNRC program came through R8."
