SHORT WAVES

THOSE fortunate enough to hear JVII (14.6), Nazakai, Japan, Saturday, December 12, at about 8:45 p.m. EST (8:45 CST), thrilled to an exquisite and unexpected chorus, composed of hundreds of tiny, warbling birds. The Overseas Hour on Monday, December 14, from 4 to 5 p.m. EST (3 to 4 CST), was radiated over JZJ (15.16). At 12:45 p.m. EST (11:45 a.m. CST) on Sunday, December 13, W2XE on 21.52 mcs was so loud that to turn the volume on more than one-fourth was to court immediate disaster to the loudspeaker . . . For genuine old Hungarian melodies and Gypsy tunes, try HAT4 (9.125), Budapest, on Sunday afternoons from 6 to 7 p.m. EST (5 to 6 CST).

For the first time, as far as I know, a whole foreign network will transmit a goodwill program for listeners, when the entire Javanese N.I.R.O.M. network of nineteen stations, radiates a special New Year's program in English on January 2, at 7:15 a.m. EST (6:15 CST). Each listener sending in a correct report to the N.I.R.O.M. at Koningsplein Wes 5, Batavia-Centrum, Java, will receive an illustrated booklet describing radio activities in the Netherland Indies.

Listening the old year out and the new year in may be indulged in, not once, but many times, by fans who follow the gay and festive New Year's celebrations of many foreign lands as listed in our programs . . . The German chancellor, Adolf Hitler, will speak from Berlin, over the Zeesen stations on New Year's Day. At this time, the exact hour is still unknown.

The 34,000-watt station at Prague, Czechoslovakia, at present is using three non-directional aerials constructed for different wave lengths, but has six directional beam aerials under construction. Regular transmissions will begin soon. R. B. Oxrieder, of State College, Penn., believes Prague will continue to use the recently adopted frequency of 11.84 mcs, since less interference is experienced with it. Prague also occasionally transmits on a frequency of 6.03 mcs, reports Herbert Campbell, of Athens, Penn. . . To increase the range of Brussels, the Belgians are constructing a 40,000-watt transmitter to take the place of the 8,000-watt ORK used at present for daily contacts with the Belgian Congo . . . Radio-Vaticano, or HVJ at Vatican City, is destined to speak with real authority when its new 50,000-watt transmitter for North and South America and Asia is completed.

A new Asmara, Eritrea, station on approximately 14.5 mcs is frequently heard calling Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, around 6:30 a.m. EST (5:30 CST), reports Joe Miller, of Brooklyn, N. Y.

OLE WINSTEDT, of NX2Z, at Hochstetter, Greenland, traveled 1,185 miles by dog sled between September, 1935, and May, 1936, so his amateur transmitter was not in operation during these months. It will be a bitter disappointment to many listeners to learn that the station they had logged as NX2Z, Greenland, was in reality a "bootleg" station operated at an unknown location by a man named Jerry Reed.

Soviet Russia is encouraging the use of amateur transmitters, of which already there are some 500 in that country. The title, "Sniper of the Ether,"

will be conferred on any amateur who establishes communication with all regions of the U.S.S.R. and all of the world's continents. A "Master of Short-Wave Connections" must in addition have carried out experimental work for at least five years.

NBC has inaugurated a daily-except-Sunday program at 8 p.m. EST (7 CST), directed to South America which is being radiated over W3XAL (6.1) of Bound Brook, N. J. On January 1, a new directional beam antenna will be brought into use. On Mondays, in collaboration with Cine Mundial, a New York Spanish publication devoted to movie news, NBC presents a variety program. Vaughn de Leath, popular singer, is featured on Wednesdays, while on Thursdays Joseph Littau and his orchestra is aired. A woman's page is broadcast on Fridays and The Three Silhouettes, girl trio, is featured on Saturdays. News comments in Spanish are given daily.

The Hong Kong transmitter that is so well heard these days has a power of only 2,400 watts.

An almost incredible reception feat must be chalked up for Clyde Griswell, of Phoenix, Ariz., who has just received a letter from the Treasury Department in New York City, verifying his reception of its new transmitter located in the New York assay office and mint. An official, in writing Griswell, states the station will be testing around 12 noon EST (11 a.m. CST), for a few weeks. And now for the big shock—this station, which has no call letters, operates on a wave length close to five meters!

MY LONDON correspondent, Roland Stansfield, writes: "I saw television the other day in the Waterloo Railway station viewing-room. Reception was excellent. Transmission was by the indirect method in which performers are first filmed by a process taking about one minute to develop and print. Direct or indirect methods are said to be equally good indoors but the indirect method is better outdoors. The chief drawback is in the small size of the viewing-screen since the images of but two or three people fill it. Operating the set isn't so difficult as you would expect since with only one station, it is unnecessary to touch most of the knobs. I had another look-in at an Oxford Street store, but white blotches, presumably static, marred reception."

The Chicago Short Wave Radio Club lists information concerning CXA4, new at Montevideo, Uruguay. The station, operating on a frequency of 6.125 mcs, relays broadcast station CX6, "Estacion Oficial," from 2 to 10 p.m. EST (1 to 9 CST) . . . HJ4ABP (6.033) at Medellin, is now the most powerful station in Colombia. It boasts 2,500 watts.

QER2, the Ravag station at Vienna, Austria, has definitely moved to a frequency of 11.8 mcs where it is broadcasting daily except Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. EST (8 a.m. to 4 p.m. CST) and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. EST (8 a.m. to 1 p.m. CST). Although QER2 has a power of 1500 watts it is seldom heard except along the eastern coast of the United States.

The mysterious Mexican short-wave station on 6.115 mcs has been identified by August Balbi, of Los Angeles, Calif., as XETU of Guadalajara. Other reports claim the call letters are XECU.

MORNING reception from Europe is enjoyable at present. The North American program from Germany, starting at 8 a.m., EST (7 CST) and radiated by DJL (15.11), always comes through with excellent strength. Not a single announcement mars the continuity of the musical selections. Reception from England is best over GSF (15.14), starting at 9 a.m., EST (8 CST).

Signal strength from the Latin broadcasters, monopolizing the dials of evenings, has reached its peak. With such an endless variety of interesting programs to choose from it is hard to pick the winners. My own selection, which may differ from yours, is: LRX (9.66), Buenos Aires, Argentina; HJ4ABH (9.616), Cartagena, Colombia; YV2RC (5.8), Caracas, Venezuela, and HRD (6.235) of La Ceiba, Honduras. A rarely logged station, VP3MR (5.985) of Georgetown, British Guiana, was heard signing off on Thursday, December 17, at 8:42 p.m., EST (7:42 CST). The signature was Ted Lewis' recording of the "Good Night Song" which was followed by the familiar "God Save the King."

Rudolph Kure, native-born Swiss of Cincinnati, informs me that starting on Saturday afternoon, January 9, at 7 p.m., EST (6 CST), and each week thereafter, The Swiss Radio Society of Berne, Switzerland, will send a program to their countrymen in North and South America employing Geneva stations HBT (9.593) and HBP (7.797). The best in Alpine yodeling now will be heard.

The Sunday program from Reykjavik, Iceland, over TFJ (12.235), now may be heard from 1:40 to 2:10 p.m., EST (12:40 to 1:10 p.m., CST).

A new Costa Rican, with call letters which are believed to be TIMS is being heard on a frequency of 5.905 mcs. The station signs off in English at 11 p.m., EST (10 CST).

The new call of CO9WR (6.282) of Sancti Spiritus, Cuba, is COHB.

ATEST information from the Dominican Republic discloses that HIIS (6.42), "La Voz de la Hispaniola," has moved to Santiago de los Caballeros, where a new 200-watt transmitter is being installed. HI4V (6.475) has moved from the congestion of Trujillo City to the comparative quiet of beautiful San Francisco de Macoris. HI8Q (6.197) of Trujillo City apparently has left the air but may occasionally be heard using the facilities of HI4D (6.555), from whom it leases time. HI9B of Santiago is on a new frequency of 5.884 mcs.

As accurate as the first stroke of Big Ben for setting your watch, so are our own time signals in Arlington, Virginia, which may be heard almost every hour daily except Sunday on 9.25 mcs. For the noon (EST) signals three frequencies are used, namely, 8.15, 12.225 and 16.3 mcs, while at midnight (EST) the frequency used is 4.287 mcs.

Balkan broadcaster YTC (6.1), Belgrade, Yugoslavia, widely reported throughout the East, comes on at 1 a.m., EST (12 mid. CST) with a reading of the latest news, then the morning's concert, and news in Serbo-Croatian at 2:30 a.m., EST (1:30 CST) and in Yugo-Slav at 2:45 a.m., EST (1:45 CST). The early transmission is concluded at 3 a.m., EST (2 CST), although the station broadcasts irregularly throughout the day until 5 p.m., EST (4 CST).

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

ACCORDING to R. E. Richardson, astronomer at the Mount Wilson Observatory, the sun is experiencing the greatest magnetic storms since 1900. This unusual activity is ushering in the best season on record for short-wave reception.

Bearing out this theory, notice the phenomenal signal strength from short-wave stations on the higher frequencies. In the evenings, DJB (15.2) of Zeesen, Germany, is the loudest ever recorded, at times actually blocking the speaker with its power. GSF (15.14) of Daventry, England, is almost as good, and even DJQ (15.28), which is beamed on South America, is being received with excellent strength.

A further indication of abnormal activity may be found on the 20-meter amateur band, which is wide open for 24 hours daily. Short-wave reception will improve steadily until some time during the year 1938, at which time peak reception for the present sunspot cycle will be experienced.

According to the Radio Manufacturers Association, the American broadcast from Czechoslovakia over OLRJA (9.55) is being heard Mondays and Thursdays on a new schedule of 8 to 11 p.m. EST (7 to 10 CST).

THE experimental Tunisian broadcaster, "Radio Tunis," is now working on a new frequency of 13.955 megs, according to Short-Wave Service of France. This station, using its amateur call of FT4AJ, was heard by John Barre, New York City, on February 24 from 4:43 to 6 p.m. EST (3:43 to 5 CST), testing on an announced frequency of 14.005 megs. The station is operated by Henry de Matties, 20 rue Es Sadikia, Tunis, Tunisia.

Starting Saturday, March 20, at 7 p.m. EST (6 CST), the regular weekly program radiated from Geneva for the benefit of Swiss citizens abroad will take place on the following new frequencies: On HBJ (14.535) beamed on North America and on HBO (11.402) beamed on South America.

Richard Verbrugge, Detroit, Mich., reports a new station announcing as XEYU, "The National University of Mexico," at Mexico City. The announcer requested reports and promised answers to all letters. The transmission, which was badly marred by interference from HJIAEP of Cartagena, Colombia, terminated at 10:30 p.m. EST (9:30 CST).

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

SHORT-WAVE reception conditions have improved somewhat but are still below normal for this time of the year. Although the principal broadcasters are heard with regularity, their signals lack the snap that characterized, for example, the Zeesen, Germany, broadcasts from the Olympics last Summer.

According to microphone announcements, two of the new Daventry transmitters are now in operation, but, except for a more noticeable stability of carrier wave, the signals do not seem to have improved much. I doubt if the full power of 50,000 watts or the new directive aerial system is yet in effect.

Two separate transmitters will be used under the call GSG (17.79) with transmissions beamed in different directions. GSG is the best of the Daventry frequencies at present and in the early afternoon is much stronger than its next-door neighbor, W3XAL (17.78), of Boundbrook, New Jersey.

THE Columbia Broadcasting System's new international short-wave broadcast transmitter, with a peak power of 40,000 watts, has been dedicated officially. Programs of interest, primarily to foreign audiences, will be selected for W2XE's trans-Atlantic broadcasts by a new program department headed by Elisabeth Ann Tucker, who, as a former member of the CBS general engineering department, for the past several years has been closely associated with Columbia short-wave activities. The following transmissions will be beamed on England and Europe daily: On 21.52 megs from 7:30 to 10 a.m. EDT (6:30 to 9 a.m. EST); on 17.76 megs from 1 to 2 p.m. EDT (12 noon to 1 p.m. EST); Europeans from 1 to 3 p.m. EDT (12 noon to 2 p.m. EST); Australians from 9 to 11 p.m. EDT (8 to 10 p.m. EST), and South Americans from 3 to 6 p.m. EDT (2 to 5 p.m. EST).

NBC's official apex transmitters include: W2XHG (41 megs), which operates daily with a power of 100 watts from 9 a.m. to 12 mid. EDT (8 a.m. to 11 p.m. EST); W8XKA (55.5), which relays W8XK of Pittsburgh, Penn., daily from 2 to 10 p.m. EDT (1 to 9 p.m. EST); W1XKA (55.5), which relays W1XK of Springfield, Mass., daily from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. EDT (6 a.m. to 12 noon EST), and W4XCA (31.6), which relays WMC of Memphis, Tenn., daily from 8:30 a.m. to 12 mid. EDT (7:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. EST).

On May 19, official telephonic communications between the United States and Shanghai, China, was inaugurated. Service opened by a conversation between Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese dictator.

A NEW and powerful short-wave station will be erected in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, this year. With 50,000 watts, it will be the most powerful short-wave broadcaster in South America. The station will have two

beams, one for Japan, Europe, and Asia, and the other for Central America. The Central American aerial should also give good program service throughout the United States.

Commodore E. F. McDonald, Jr., president of the Zenith Radio Corporation, announces that his company has moved to its new factory in northwest Chicago, which is the largest radio factory in the world on one floor. The new plant will be capable of turning out 10,500 all-wave receivers every eight hours, or nearly 22 radio sets a minute!

Kahuku, Hawaii, commercial stations KQH (14.92), KIO (11.68) and KRO (5.84) have been licensed to communicate with relay broadcast station KMEF, which is located aboard the U. S. S. Avocet, for the purpose of transmitting programs relating to the Solar Eclipse Expedition. Bolinas, Calif., stations KQJ, KKZ, KEI and KEB also will be utilized.

Sintonia states that the new short-wave station CPI (9.85), located at Sucre, Bolivia, is operating from 9 to 11 p.m. EDT (8 to 10 p.m. EST) daily.

It will be a great disappointment to many short-wave listeners to learn that a recent communication from the Ministry of Communications in New Zealand states that the popular short-wave transmitter ZMBJ, aboard the S. S. Awatea, has been ordered to stop broadcasting. The reason is unknown.

ACCORDING to Clyde Criswell of Phoenix, Ariz., African amateurs on the 10-meter band may be heard between 12 noon and 2 p.m. EDT (11 a.m. and 1 p.m. EST); Europeans from 1 to 3 p.m. EDT (12 noon to 2 p.m. EST); Australians from 9 to 11 p.m. EDT (8 to 10 p.m. EST), and South Americans from 3 to 9 p.m. EDT (2 to 8 p.m. MST).

Herbert Campbell, of Athens, Penn., writes to say that a bond selection, which is probably the Peruvian anthem, or a stirring fife and drum selection, is always played just prior to station announcements over OAX5A (11.8), of Ica, Peru. This station has been coming through with excellent volume of late.

David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, in a speech before the American Physical Society, stated in part: "Short-wave transmission of pictures and printed or written material has been an accomplished fact for several years. It is now in daily service between Europe and America. The broadcasting of a facsimile newspaper into every business office and home, in half-hourly installments if desired, is perfectly feasible. The establishment of such a service is now an economic rather than a technical problem.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

GENERAL Electric's short-wave stations W2XAD and W2XAF will become the strongest in America and probably in the world upon completion of the new 100,000-watt transmitter, permission for the erection of which has just been granted by the Federal Communications Commission. The new transmitter will be a linear, radio-frequency amplifier and may be used by either of the two short-wave stations.

The previous strength of 18,000 to 25,000 watts for W2XAD and W2XAF, respectively, has rivaled the world's strongest short-wave stations, and the greater signal strength should permit worldwide reception throughout the year," according to B. W. Bullock, assistant broadcasting manager of the General Electric Company.

W2XAD now broadcasts approximately 220 hours a month and W2XAF 200 hours. It is anticipated that this will be increased as the result of the greater range of the new transmitter, which is expected to be completed by the early part of next year.

R. B. Orrieder of State College, Penn., is hearing a new Cuban, believed to be COCW of Havana, on a frequency of 6.324 megs. The announcer usually includes broadcast stations CMW and CMHX in the announcements.

A MATEUR radio came through nobly last month in an emergency call. On a small island in the Pacific Ocean, 75 miles from Los Angeles, Calif., a tiny four-months-old girl was in need of medical attention. Amateur station W6JLF, operated by L. P. Elliott, the only contact that San Nicolas Island has with the mainland, established contact with an amateur in Redondo Beach, Calif., who called the police, who in turn notified the Los Angeles police and the Coast Guard. The latter had a boat ready to sail by the time a doctor arrived, and before morning the boat, carrying the doctor, hove to on the lee side of desolate San Nicolas Island, and another mark was chalked up on the already enviable record established by amateurs.

The new schedule of broadcasts from short-wave stations LRU and LXR, "Radio El Mundo," Buenos Aires, Argentina, is as follows: Over LRU (15.29), daily from 7 to 9 a.m. EST (6 to 8 a.m. CST); over LXR (9.65), daily from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. EST (8:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. CST). On July 1, these short-wave stations were used in relaying the inaugural program of the new blue and white network of "Radio El Mundo," comprising key station LRI in Buenos Aires and affiliates in Rosario, Cordoba, Bahia Blanca, Tucuman, Mendoza, Resistencia (Chaco) and San Juan.

Mr. Jardillier, Minister of Posts, Telegraphs and Telephones for France, is reported to have recently stated that the new short-wave transmitter of "Radio Coloniale" was nearing completion and that experimental broadcasts would soon be carried on, with a

power output that would be gradually increased until the station's ultimate maximum power of 50,000 watts had been reached. Reception of the French station should be greatly improved.

In a letter from Leonard Sawyer of Woodstock, N. H., I learn that DJP (11.85) of Zeesen, Germany, may be heard Mondays at 7 p.m. EST (6 p.m. CST), relaying a program from Belgrade, Yugoslavia, for the benefit of Slavic emigrants in North and South America.

Ashley Walcott of San Francisco, Calif., sends the following informative notes: A station on 9.415 megs, the same frequency as PLV of Bandoeng, Java, has been relaying the Javanese NIROM programs intermittently each morning from 5:30 to 9 a.m. EST (4:30 to 8 a.m. CST). . . . Erlanger & Galinger of Manila, Philippines, tested their new short-wave transmitter on 11.84 megs for two weeks in June and then it went off the air. On the first of July the station resumed broadcasting on an announced frequency of 9.57 megs and it may be heard daily on this frequency from approximately 4:30 to 9 a.m. EST (3:30 to 8 a.m. CST). A slight heterodyne from WIXAL may be noted . . . OPM (10.14) of Leopoldville, Belgian Congo, may be heard phoning in straight speech, irregularly from 8:30 to 9 a.m. EST (7:30 to 8 a.m. CST) "The Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, station on 15.43 megs verified for me in May as IUG, not IUD as reported by several other short-wave listeners. As for the code signature being IUD, not IUG, nearly all operators of the Italian Colonial telephone stations have notoriously poor lists for code and it would be extremely difficult to tell the difference between a dot and a dash" . . . FZE (17.28) of Djibouti, Somal Coast, is heard calling Paris on phone once or twice a week near 8:30 a.m. EST (7:30 a.m. CST).

The owners of broadcast station KSTP in St. Paul, Minn., have been granted a permit to erect a 1,000-watt apex station to operate on 25.95 megs . . . The Knickerbock Broadcasting Company of New York City, N. Y., will erect a 100-watt apex station to operate on 26.55 megs.

The "Government Radio Station," Rangoon, Burma, is still being heard on the Pacific Coast daily from 9 to 9:30 a.m. EST (8 to 8:35 a.m. CST), on an announced frequency of 6.007 megs. A letter from W. J. Byrne, engineer-in-charge of the above station, states that the broadcasts are merely experimental, are intended primarily for reception and report by various radio stations in Burma, and not for the entertainment of the general public, although reports from listeners who may happen to pick up the broadcasts are most welcome . . . A new station, ZGB of Kuala Lumpur, Federated Malay States, whose announced frequency is 13.643 megs, may frequently be heard between 7:30 and 8:30 a.m. EST (6:30 and 7:30 a.m. CST), phoning PLQ of Bandoeng, Java, in inverted speech.

Telegrafos, Telefonos Radio Nacionales of San Salvador, El Salvador, to Louis Ambrosius of Louisville, Ky., states that the only short-wave transmitter in service there is YSJ (13.41) for daily commercial telephone communication with Miami, Fla., from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 2 to 5 p.m. EST (7 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. CST); YSM (11.71), from 12 noon to 2 p.m. EST (11 a.m. to 1 p.m. CST) and YSD (7.894) from 6 to 10 p.m. EST (5 to 9 p.m. CST), for relaying the musical programs of Broadcast Station YSS. Other listeners report that YSD is only in operation at present from 9 to 10:15 p.m. EST (8 to 9:15 p.m. CST). YSM has an additional frequency of 9.52 megs, which is used irregularly. The station officials welcome reports, which should be sent to the address given above.

The mysterious VE9HS mentioned

here last week has now been identified as a 200-watt RCA transmitter owned by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, aboard the RMS Nasoepic, a Hudson Bay Company supply ship, which has been opening up a new Northwest passage through Bellots Straits, The Gulf of Bothia, Lancaster Sound and into Baffin Bay. VE9HS contacts VE9AV in Toronto, on a frequency of 15.19 megs, intermittently from approximately 2:20 to 7 p.m. EST (1:20 to 6 p.m. CST), after which a shift is made to 11.705 megs.

A new Mexican station, announcing as the "Short-Wave Station of the National Republican Party of Guadalajara," in Jalisco, operates on a frequency of 7.098 megs, daily from 9 to 11 p.m., or 12 mid. EST (8 to 10, or 11 p.m. CST). Announcements are made in English occasionally and once it was stated that the station was owned by Dr. Wrigley or Brinkley. A bugle-call is used from time to time as an interval signal.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in parentheses are megacycles)

THE day of erratic and unsatisfactory short-wave reception has largely passed. Today all-wave receivers are sensitive and easy to tune, transmitters more powerful and aerials more efficient. Because of these factors we are now able to enjoy daily programs from the leading stations of the world. In fact, there are only a few days during the course of an entire year in which foreign reception is not only possible but of excellent program value. Daily news comments and entertainment features from England, Germany, Japan, Spain and many other countries, are now accepted as a matter of fact by thousands of listeners. In the future as more and more powerful short-wave stations are built, as programs are made available in more variety and schedules extended, short-wave reception is bound to play an increasingly important part in providing the international side of the daily education and entertainment fare from our receivers.

During the present important session of the League of Nations, the short-wave transmitters at Prangins, Switzerland, are being used daily except Saturdays and Sundays to radiate reports of its activities as follows: Over HBO (11.402), from 2 to 2:15 p.m. EST (1 to 1:15 p.m. CST) and over HBL (9.345), from 7:30 to 7:45 p.m. and from 8 to 8:15 p.m. EST (6:30 to 6:45 p.m. and from 7 to 7:15 p.m. CST).

August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., writes that XGOX of Nanking, China, is not off the air, as recently reported but still going strong daily from 7 to 11 a.m. EST (6 to 10 a.m. CST) on a new frequency of 9.8 megs. A woman announcer gives a news bulletin in English, concerning the Chinese factor of the Sino-Japanese conflict, at 7:30 a.m. EST (6:30 a.m. CST). The call letters are given in English at 7:45 a.m. EST (6:45 a.m. CST). The broadcaster relays 75,000-watt Broadcast Station XGOA . . . OLR4A (11.84) of Prague, Czechoslovakia, is now being heard daily from 12 noon to 2 p.m. EST (11 a.m. to 1 p.m. CST) and from 11 p.m. to 1:15 a.m. EST (10 p.m. to 12:15 a.m. CST) . . . XEBR of Hernosillo, Mexico, may be heard on either 11.82 or 10.65 megs irregularly from 4 to 7 p.m. EST (3 to 6 p.m. CST).

An interesting program will be the broadcast over CN8AJ (7.045-14.09) of Casablanca, Morocco, at 2 a.m. EST (1 a.m. CST), on Monday, October 11. Send reports to R. Cretien of 29 Rue des Villas, Casablanca.

"Radio Nacional" in Salamanca, Spain, at General Franco's headquarters in that city, may be heard daily up to 8:30 or 8:45 p.m. EST (7:30 or 7:45 p.m. CST) on a frequency of approximately 10.37 megs (the same frequency as that used by EAJ43 of the Canary Islands). War news in English is given at 8:15 a.m. EST (7:15 a.m. CST), which is usually followed by a short musical program. Reports should be sent to Radio Nacional, Salamanca, Spain . . . Carl Eder of Willmar, Minn., reports hearing a French communist station, announced as "Radio Liberte" (9.53), signing off at 6:33 p.m. EST (5:33 p.m. CST). Announcements in French, German and Italian gave the address as Radio Liberte, 10 Ave. de la Liberte, Beacon Courbevoie, France.

John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., believes that the recent tuning-in of UPOL, the short-wave station of the

Soviet air base at the North Pole, afforded him one of the greatest thrills he has yet experienced in dialing the higher frequencies. A letter to him from the authorities in Moscow, states that UPOL operates on a frequency of 14.409 megs, daily from 2 to 4 p.m. EST (1 to 3 p.m. CST).

The series of broadcasts sponsored by the International DX-ers Alliance, from St. Denis, on the lonely and remote "Ile de Reunion," in the Indian Ocean, will be transmitted over FR8VX (14.34), at 3 p.m. EST (2 p.m. CST), on October 15, 16 and 17. These three broadcasts will constitute the first programs ever to be heard from this island. The novelty of the programs will be further enhanced by the fact that they will be radiated over the transmitter owned by Prince Vinh San, exiled King of Annam, who will preside at the mike.

WIXAL, the "University of the Air" at Boston, Mass., will operate according to the following schedule this season: On 15.23 megs, daily from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST (1:30 to 3:30 p.m. CST) and Sundays from 10:15 a.m. to 12 noon EST (9:15 to 11 a.m. CST); on 11.79 megs, daily from 5 to 6:30 p.m. EST (4 to 5:30 p.m. CST), and 6.04 megs, Sundays only, from 5 to 7 p.m. EST (4 to 6 p.m. CST).

Manuel Barbers of Buenos Aires sends me the following news concerning South American short-wavers: CXA8, Montevideo, Uruguay, relay station of LR3 of Buenos Aires, Argentina, now broadcasting on a frequency of 9.04 megs, is operating daily from 7 a.m. to 12 mida. EST (6 a.m. to 11 p.m. CST). Announcements thus far have been in Spanish only, but at the invitation of the station, Mr. Barbers is preparing a record with the station identification in Portuguese, Italian, French, English, German and Russian. Send reports to Belgrano 1841, Buenos Aires . . . "La Voz de Pereira" (6.145), Pereira, Colombia, formerly known as HJ4ABA, has changed its call to HJ6ABA . . . OAX4G, "Radio Grellaud," Lima, Peru, is now operating on a frequency of 6.26 megs . . . The new address of CXA2 is Camino Carrasco 5151, Montevideo, Uruguay. This station has been off the air for some time but will soon resume operations with a new 5,000-watt transmitter on a frequency of 6 megs . . . CB1180, "La Voz de Valdivia, Radio Sur Alivio," Valdivia, Chile, relays Broadcast Station CB69, on a frequency of 12.007 megs, daily from 7 to 10 p.m. EST (6 to 9 p.m. CST). The address is Casilla 731 . . . CB1170 (11.78) relays the programs of CB89, Radio Otto Becker, Ahumada 113, Santiago, Chile, daily from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 3:30 to 11 p.m. EST (9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2:30 to 10 p.m. CST).

According to Elizabeth-Ann Tucker, program director for W2XE, New York City, South American listeners have presented a new problem to the Columbia Broadcasting System by their almost unanimous insistence on programs devoted to descriptions of the latest New York and Hollywood fash-

ions. Plans to keep them in touch with the latest Fifth Avenue and motion-picture creations are now being worked out. DX-ers in England show a decided preference for American dance bands and singers of popular melodies, but reports from Latin America, South Africa and other distant lands indicate that classical programs, such as the Sunday Evening Hour, the Philharmonic concerts and Howard Barlow's "Everybody's Music" also have a large following.

E. Reinhard, of Red Bank, N. J., reports hearing CSW, Lisbon, Portugal, on a new frequency of 11.84 mega, on Sunday, September 20, from 2 to 2:30 p.m. EST (1 to 1:30 p.m. CST). This frequency may be used on a daily basis if the tests are successful.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

ACCORDING to an official announcement, recently intercepted from Daventry, England, transmissions from that short-wave center, directed upon sections of the world not covered at this time, will be broadcast in several foreign languages just as soon as additional transmitters and aerials can be constructed. Programs in Arabic, Spanish, and Portuguese will be inaugurated in the near future. Apparently Great Britain is preparing to take full advantage of the use of short-wave broadcasting as a powerful and effective instrument of propaganda. Up to this time, transmissions from Daventry have been in English exclusively. . . Used as a fifth transmitter, during part of transmission four, CSP (15.31) is now carrying the Daventry programs daily from 1:35 p.m. EST (12.35 p.m. CST). . . JZJ (11.8), Tokyo, may be heard Mondays from 8 to 9 a.m. EST (7 to 8 a.m. CST), without interference from COGF (11.805), the Cuban station, which badly heterodynes the Nipponese programs on other days of the week.

The present schedule of English broadcasts over the Soviet transmitters is as follows: over RNE (12.06), daily from 10 to 11 p.m. EST (9 to 10 p.m. CST); Sundays, Mondays and Fridays from 4 to 5 p.m. EST (3 to 4 p.m. CST); Sundays and Wednesdays from 6 to 7 a.m. EST (5 to 6 a.m. CST), and on Sundays from 10 to 11 a.m. EST (9 to 10 a.m. CST); over RAN (9.6) and RKA (7.54), daily from 7 to 9:10 p.m. EST (6 to 8:10 p.m. CST). Reports to Soviet stations should never be addressed to individuals but to Radio Center, Moscow, U.S.S.R.

The Brazilian government is considering the construction of a 50,000-watt combined broadcast and short-wave transmitter for radiating coffee propaganda. The station would cost \$720,000. Two directional aerials, beamed on the United States and Europe respectively, would be employed by the station. . . The radio technical division of the Technological Museum in Vienna, Austria, has put a new transmitter, with call OEIRV, into operation. This 500-watt station, which can operate on any wave-length between 10 and 95 meters, will not be used for ordinary broadcasting, but is intended as a research station. Occasionally it will, however, broadcast Vienna music to foreign countries and especially to parts of the world which very seldom hear Austrian programs.

On Thanksgiving Day, November 25, at 7:30 p.m. EST (6:30 p.m. CST), the Zeesen, Germany, stations will transmit a special Thanksgiving program for North America, consisting of a suitable selection of music and songs, and a commentary from the Thanksgiving dinner of the American colony in Berlin.

A letter of verification from JDY (9.925) of Darien, Kwantung, received by Billie Byrd, Jr., of Little Rock, Arkansas, states: "The JDY short-wave radio broadcasting station commenced its broadcast on July 16, in order to inform the whole world of the righteous standpoint of Japan and the progress of the China incident against the incorrect and malignant propaganda broadcast by China. We should be very pleased if you could kindly tell your friends of our broadcast, and we earnestly hope many people will understand the true situation of Japan." An enclosed photograph pictured the very modernistic building in which the transmitter was housed. Surrounding

the structure were wires carrying a charge of electricity. This 10,000-watt broadcaster gives music and the news in Japanese daily from 7 to 7:30 a.m. EST (6 to 6:30 a.m. CST); news in the Manchou language from 7:31 to 7:45 a.m. EST (6:31 to 6:45 a.m. CST), and news in English from 7:46 to 8 a.m. EST (6:46 to 7 a.m. CST).

ZIK2 (10.6), located in Belize, British Honduras, is now being heard regularly on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, at 7:30 p.m. EST (6:30 p.m. CST), with very good signal strength.

According to the American Commercial Attaché in Paris, a new station, known as Radio 37 (8.33), was inaugurated on September 5. Broadcasts take place week-days from 7 to 9 a.m., 1:45 to 7 p.m. and from 1:50 to 4 a.m. EST (6 to 8 a.m., 12:45 to 8 p.m. and from 12:50 to 3 a.m. CST), and on Sundays from 1:45 to 7 p.m. and from 2:30 to 9 a.m. EST (12:45 to 8 p.m. and from 1:30 to 8 a.m. CST). I would like to hear from any readers that have heard this station.

John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., has just received word that FZE8 (17.28), Djibouti, French Somaliland, tests with music and voice, the first Thursday of each month from 7:45 to 8:15 a.m. EST (6:45 to 7:15 a.m. CST). This station is regarded as a difficult DX catch.

On Friday, November 26, at 11:30 a.m. EST (10:30 a.m. CST), the story of Southwark Cathedral, one of the oldest and most attractive churches in the British Empire, will be broadcast from Daventry. St. Mary Overie, the first church to occupy this spot, near London Bridge, in London, is believed to have been founded in 604 A.D. The first cathedral, a part of which is still incorporated in the present edifice, was erected by two Norman knights at the time of Norman the Conqueror. Following destruction of this structure by fire in the 13th century, the present cathedral was started and finally completed in the 18th century. At one time this magnificent church was sold by James I to a group of nineteen men, for about \$4,000.

At present there is only one broadcasting station in operation in Angola, Portuguese Africa. It is a 500-watt, privately owned station at Lobito, using the call CR6AA, and a frequency of 7.174 mcs. Broadcasts are radiated on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. EST (2:30 to 4:30 p.m. CST).

Thorne Donnelley has been granted a license to operate WOGK, the transmitter aboard his yacht Mako, on the following frequencies: 13.245, 8.82, 6.66, 2.738, and 2.118 mcs. Power of the station is 100 watts. . . Speaking of yachts, how many have heard KFZT (2.178), located aboard Commander Eugene McDonald's yacht Mizpah? Although located in the Chicago yacht harbor, the Commander has to contact station WM1 (2.55) in Lorraine, Ohio, because of the absence of a coastal station in that city, and then have his call sent back to the Windy City via long-distance telephone, in order to talk to his friends who are only a short distance away across the water, as the crew flies.

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company has requested a permit to erect another 20,000-watt trans-Pacific short-wave telephone transmitter at Dixon, Calif., to operate on a frequency of 19.08 mcs.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

THE Federal Communications Commission has just provided allocations of frequencies to various classes of service in the newly developed portion of the radio spectrum from 25 to 300 mcs. From the standpoint of space in the so-called radio ether, there now comes under regulation ten times the "ether space" that has ever before been attempted in this country.

Seven channels between 44 and 108 mcs and twelve channels between 156 and 300 mcs are made available for the assignment of television stations. Each visual broadcaster must have a frequency channel 6 mcs (6,000 kilocycles) in width. The ordinary short-wave broadcast station requires a channel 10 kilocycles in width.

Seventy-five channels between 41.02 and 43.98 mcs are made available for assignment to short-wave broadcast stations, while twenty-nine channels between 30 and 40 mcs have been allotted for police use. Other services that have been assigned definite channels in this new section of the ether are aviation, relay broadcast stations, fixed service, experimental service, mobile press service, geophysical and motion-picture services, coastal and ship-harbor, special-emergency, marine-fire, and special services.

While the effect of these new allocations will not be immediately apparent to the general public, the importance of this action is the profound influence it will have upon the development of the radio industry, because in a manner it sets up guiding posts for every phase of the industry, including research, design, manufacture and practical operation. This is one of the most important basic actions taken in recent

years in the development of radio, and there has now been laid the cornerstone of a vast new development of radio in its application to the service of the public.

T. Strzelinski informs me that the Polish authorities are very anxious to get reports of reception on the new programs to North America which are being radiated over Warsaw Stations SPW (13.635) and SPD (11.535) weekdays from 6 to 7 p.m. EST (5 to 6 p.m. CST) and on Sundays from 6 to 8 p.m. EST (5 to 7 p.m. CST). New verification cards, artistically designed, will be forwarded in reply to every report sent to Polskie Radio, 5 Mazowiecka Street, Warsaw, Poland.

The new 25,000-watt transmitter of Short-Wave Station COCQ (9.75), Havana, Cuba, will be inaugurated in a few days. Initial tests heard on Sunday morning, November 14, indicate that this station will be one of the loudest on the short-wave channels. It is hoped that the programs will be more of a high-class and varied nature than those that were radiated from the old station . . . COCO (6.01) is now using an increased power of 2,500 watts . . . COBC, "El Progreso Cubano," is now operating very close to its assigned frequency of 9.363 mcs.

The new Cuban list reports Station COCA (9.7), of Gallardo No. 102, Havana, is now on the air, although thus far I have had no report of it being heard.

According to James Moore of San Francisco, Calif., Short-Wave Station KZRM (9.57) is being heard on Saturdays, often until 9 and 10 a.m. EST (8 and 9 a.m. CST), with a program which is entitled "The Rounds of Manila Night Clubs." The station usually signs off with the selection "The Organ Grinder's Swing," played by Johnny Jones and his orchestra.

The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company is now making important changes at the W8XX transmitters at Saxonburg, Penn. The improvements which are being made include the construction of two new directional rhombic antennas, one to South America, beamed on Buenos Aires, and one to Europe, beamed on London. These new aerials will increase the power many times and will greatly improve reception in South America and Europe. Later it is intended to erect a directional antenna and to increase the power of the transmitter of WIXK at Millis, Mass.

John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., suggests that listeners be on the lookout for South African amateurs on the 20-meter band between the hours of 11 p.m. and 12 mid. EST (10 and 11 p.m. CST). At 11:50 p.m. EST (10:50 p.m. CST) he was fortunate enough to hear FB8AB (14.28), located on the island of Madagascar.

Broadcasts from a radio station on horseback in the wilderness of the Amazonian jungle may be heard by any short-wave listeners in the United States fortunate enough to pick-up VP3THE, the transmitter of the Terry-Holden Expedition, which is expected to start test contacts with the NBC in the near future. Two listeners have already reported reception of VP3THE on frequencies of 13.8 and 13.9 mcs, respectively, when the station was in communication with VP3BG (14.12), of Georgetown, British Guiana. Orison W. Hungerford, the radio engineer of the expedition, is guiding the party through the jungle regions by means of triangulated radio bearings. On one of the early broadcasts from British

Guiana, which the NBC expects to pick-up for its network listeners, John Melville, half-Scottish and half-Indian, who is chief of the Wapishann tribe, will be the featured actor.

Eugenio Darlington, Director of Short-Wave Broadcasting for the General Electric Company at Schenectady, N. Y., advises that his amateur station, W2ALP (28.54 and 29), is on the air Saturdays from 1 to 3 p.m. EST (12 noon to 2 p.m. CST), in communication with either G5AU in London, or W6OSH in Hollywood, Calif., and anyone hearing these transmissions is invited to send reports to him at the above address.

Champion tuner of the ultrahigh-frequencies, Clyde Criswell of Phoenix, Ariz., who has received the sound-transmissions accompanying the television programs radiated from Alexandra Palace, in London, every day except three since October 19, now adds further laurels to his remarkable record by logging the sound-channel (42 mcs) accompanying the television programs from the Eiffel Tower, in Paris, France. Mr. Criswell has also received a letter to the effect that he is the first listener to report reception of General Electric's new 41-mc transmitter, W2XOY.

The first in an interesting new series of programs dealing with music in African life, which will take up the earliest known African music, will be radiated over Daventry, on Friday, December 2, at 1:40 p.m. EST (12:40 p.m. CST). Subsequent talks in this series will discuss "Witch Doctors and Music, Natural Jazz from Africa and The Keyboard Music of the Bantu." It is hoped that Professor Kirby, who is the speaker on these programs, will be able to illustrate the comments with his recordings of native African music.

Reuven Sokolovsky of 4, Nachlat-Benjamin Street, Tel-Aviv, Palestine, has informed Harold Schrock of Bloomington, Ill., that he will soon put the first short-wave transmitter in that country on the air, under the call letters ZC6AB.

A powerful new short-wave station which will be completed early in 1938 is now under construction at Singapore. A new 60,000-watt commercial short-wave telephone station for direct communications between Malaya and Great Britain is also to be built soon in the same city. The Greek Government has been erecting short-wave telephone stations at Mytilene, Chios and Crete, for communication with coastal shipping and Athens, Greece. The Mytilene-Athens circuit is already in operation.

A letter from R. B. Orrieder of State College, Penn., states that HID, "Radio Opinion," Trujillo, Dominican Republic, is at present broadcasting on a frequency of 9.29 mcs . . . XEWV of Mexico City, D. F., has also shifted slightly in frequency to 9.5 mcs, where it is very effectively blotting out transmissions from popular Colombian Broadcaster HJ1ABE.

The American Consulate in Saigon, French Indo-China, reports that the four broadcasting stations in that country are as follows: Establishments Boy-Landry, 213 Rue Catinat, Saigon, which operates on 11.7 mcs, with 200 watts power, and on 6.03 mcs, with 150 watts power (it is believed the latter frequency has been changed to 6.22 mcs); Electric Enterprises, 98 Rue d'Espagne, Saigon, owned by Michael Robert, operates on 5.825 mcs, with 10 watts power; Radio Club de l'Indochine, Hanoi, Tonkin, operates on 14.558 mcs, with 15 watts power, and on 7.445 mcs, with 100 watts power; Radio Club de l'Indochine, Haiphong, Tonkin, operates on 4.615 mcs, with 15 watts power. Stations in French Indo-China do not use call-letters.
