CT1AA, Lisbon, Portugal

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The early shortwave press contains countless references to station CT1AA in Lisbon, Portugal. It was known as Radio Colonial, and from 1930 to 1938 it shows up on just about every list of active stations, and in many DXers' reports of stations heard. It was often well heard. Beyond listings and DX reports, however, there is little information about CT1AA.

The station started out as an amateur operation, call letters P1AA (in the days when a country's initial was often used as the prefix). When standard callsigns were adopted the call became CT1AA. The owner was Abílio Nunes dos Santos, Jr.

Nunes dos Santos appears to be one of Portugal's "fathers of radio." He started his amateur activities in 1923. It was in September of the following year that he became a "broadcasting amateur" on an experimental basis, and March 1, 1925 when he began regular broadcasting. The station operated from the warehouse of his family's business, the Chiados Department Stores, which sold RCA and Phillips radios. Broadcasts were on mediumwave at that time, and the station used the slogan "Radio Portugal." The government closed down broadcasting from May to July 1925. Nunes dos Santos returned to the air on October 25, as CT1AA.

It is unclear if CT1AA was in fact Portugal's "first" broadcaster in time, but it appears that it was first in the sense that KDKA was "first" in the United States—it offered scheduled programming designed specifically for broadcast listening by the general public, and the first to capture a regular audience.

Mediumwave operations ended in 1934. Starting in 1926, Nunes dos Santos also transmitted on shortwave, under the name Radio Colonial. The programs were different from those of the mediumwave service. Shortwave operations continued until 1938, by which time the station's call letters had changed from CT1AA to to CS2WA.

PORTUGAL

A couple of short-wave stations are supposed to exist in Portugal, but until recently we never saw any actual reports of reception of them. A British friend reports hearing CT1AA, Lisbon, on 42.9 meters, but fails to give the schedule. As with the other European stations, it is safe to assume that it is on the air not later than about 7:00 p.m., E.S.T. The first American reference to the station that I have found is in the Fall 1931 issue of *Radio Design* (left), the house organ of the Pilot Radio & Tube Corp., whose *Wasp* receivers were among the first "consumer" shortwave sets. *Radio Design* contained a lot of short-wave news. Happily, the station can be remembered through its QSL-cards, which graced many DXers' collections in the 1930s. Here is the card that was used in 1932 for amateur operations.

Reports for broadcast operations usually brought a card (see pgs. 4-6), but here is a letter, from 1930, which appears to be for broadcast operations. It is from Nunes dos Santos to a listener in South Amboy, New Jersey.

The two cards shown below were the regular QSLs sent by CT1AA for broadcast operations. Look carefully and you will see that they are not exactly the same. The 1932 card contains no mention of the slogan, Radio Colonial; the address and telephone information is different; and all pictures but the one in the upper right are different views (of the same scenes).

Here are the backs of the cards on the previous page. The 1932 card is a "no data" thank you card. The 1937 card contains date and frequency, but lacks a verification statement. Nonetheless, finding either of these in your mailbox would be a very good day.

By 1938, CT1AA had become CS2WA, and it had a new QSL.

PORTUGAL

Members report that the call of Radio Colonial CT1AA of Lisbon, 9.650 kc/s, has been changed to CS2WA. This station, heard with a strong signal in the east, leaves the air too early to be heard well on the West Coast. Its identification signal—a cuckoo call thrice is one of the most readily distinguishable on the air.
